

Grove Scans Parking Meters

COTTAGE GROVE—In special session Wednesday evening the city council canvassed the vote on the water bond election held here Tuesday. Clint Ocumpaugh was appointed councilman from ward three to succeed Glen Flatters, who resigned, and the new councilman was present for the meeting. According to present plans bids will soon be called for the extension of the sewer line on south 10th street. The possibility of placing parking meters on Main street to solve the parking situation came up for discussion but no definite action was taken.

Gates at the Cottage Grove dam were opened this week to start emptying the water from the lake in order to prepare for the rainy season and flood waters. The flow is 500 cubic feet per second, which should mean a raise of two feet in the Coast Fork River. The emptying will be continued until approximately Oct. 15.

This being a rainy week only about one-half the number of golfers were out Tuesday for the two-ball foursome at the Golf Course. The enrollment at Cottage Grove Union High this week reached 494 as compared to 483 at this time last year. The Senior Class boasts the largest number in the history of high schools here, with 101 members. This week the school board elected Joseph C. Toman, of Lincoln, Nebraska, to fill the position and he is expected to be in Cottage Grove by Oct. 1 to assume his duties as assistant coach and teacher of history. Toman is now employed in the schools of Lincoln, Neb., and is obtaining a release to come to Oregon. He is a graduate of the University of Nebraska and has had graduate work at Northwestern University, Denver University and the University of Southern California. For several years he was physical education

director and coach in the Lincoln (Neb.) schools. Recently he was athletic director for the veterans' hospital at Lincoln. He has a wife and four-year-old son.

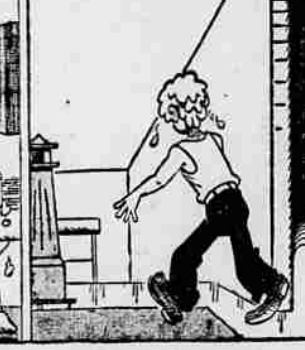

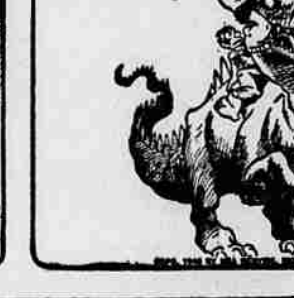
