Johnny Vandermeer, who went 15 scoreless innings in the 0-0 struggle, had the Dodgers swinging futilely again and he was given the benefit of a 2-0 lead in the first of the fifth on a two run double by Claude Corbitt off surprise Dodger starter, Art Herring.

The Dodgers made all their fifth inning runs with two outs. Singles by pinch-hitter Stan Rokjok, Eddie Stanky, and Joe Medwick produced one run then Walker sent a fast ball soaring over the right field screen for three more. Hank Behrman came in to protect Herring's lead and pitched scoreless relief ball until relieved by Hugh Casey, who allowed the Reds their final run in the ninth. The Dodgers also added another in the seventh.

In the only other game, the Tigers made 21 hits, six of them by George Kell to defeat the Indians at Cleveland, 15-1.
