Reedsport Shuffles Council Next Month

REEDSPORT—Citizens will vote Nov. 5 for a new mayor and three city councilmen to replace John Skaaluren, present mayor, and John Unger, Art Olsen and Sherman Smiley, present councilmen whose terms of office will expire. Petitions for the reelection of these officials have been circulated and returned according to City Manager C. H. Bennett, as have petitions for the placing on the ballot of the names of Howard Humphrey and John Hubbard, candidates for the office of city councilmen.

Four wrecks have occurred in this vicinity within the last four days, three of them on Oregon highway 38 between Scottsburg and Reedsport and the other on Highway 102 within the southern Reedsport city limits. Friday a special Greyhound bus carrying the Albany High School team to North Bend was forced off the highway by a logging truck. The bus turned over on its side below the highway. A small tree stopped it from toppling into the Umpqua River.

Saturday an empty lumber carrier of the Dimmick Lumber Co. left the highway and overturned in the Frank Spencer yard near the Fir Grove Auto Park as it tried to avoid hitting a car. The automobile driven by Frank Wilkes, a 1941 Ford, was completely demolished.

A Lower Umpqua Taxi was badly wrecked when it missed the Mill Creek bridge on Highway 38, and the cab of a truck driven by P. F. McAllister was totally destroyed when that vehicle left Highway 38 at the school road intersection and ran down a 100 foot bank, a tractor being transported on the truck running over and flattening the truck cab and landing 50 feet beyond the truck.

No serious personal injuries were suffered by any of the occupants but considerable damage to property resulted in each accident. The automobile of Hugh Furney was also badly damaged near the Y Cafe on Highway 101 when it was overtaken and rammed from the rear by an empty log truck Monday morning.

Earl Stevens, Lieut. (jg), U. S. Navy, enroute to his home in California, suffered a broken leg and other injuries when struck by a hit and run driver near the Coos-Douglas county line, about 3 p.m. Tuesday while crossing Highway 101. He was brought to Reedsport by Unger ambulance where his injuries were treated by Dr. Marvin Amick and Dr. Charles R. Howitt, after which he was removed to Kelzer Hospital, North Bend.

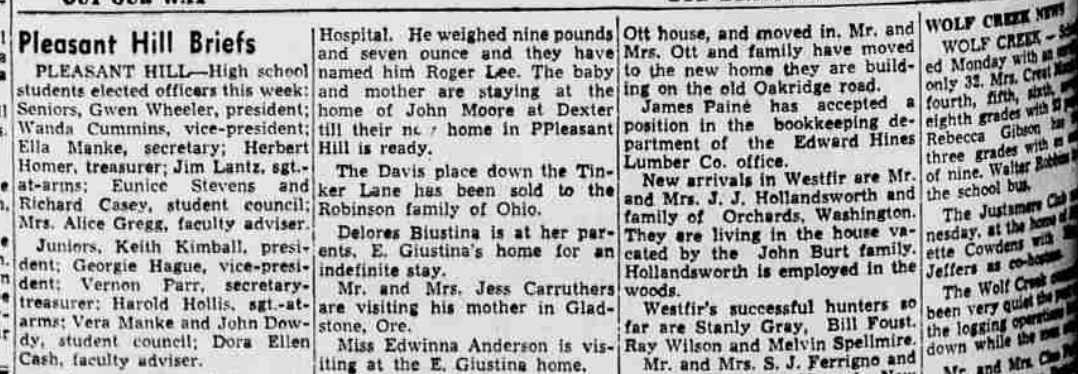
