Fire Chief Calls For Safety Acts

This is Fire Prevention Week
and Fire Chief W. E. Nussbaum
Monday asked cooperation of all
citizens in making the week a time
of tightening up the city's de-
fenses against fire.

"We can succeed in combatting
fire only to the extent that the citi-
zens of Eugene cooperate," the
chief said.

Notes Essays
He also called attention to the
essay contest for students on
"What Can Be Done to Prevent
Fires in Homes?" Deadline for en-
tering essays is Oct. 14. They may
be left with any member of the
Eugene Lane County Assn. of Fire
Insurance Agents. Prizes totaling
\$100 will be awarded for the best
essays.

To show the need for continual
vigilance, Chief Nussbaum said that
at the present rate fire losses of
almost \$800 million will be in-
curred throughout the nation in
1946, an increase of 22 per cent
over the losses of \$484 million in
1945. In 1945 alone, 11,000 persons
lost their lives and more than
20,000 were injured by fire.

Fires Avoidable

"The tragedy of these figures," he
asserted, "is that 90 per cent of all
home fires are avoidable. Sound,
fire-safe construction, control of
human carelessness and elimina-
tion of common fire hazards that
exist in the average home would
curtail drastically the toll of fire.

"A serious responsibility to pre-
vent fires lies on the shoulders of
every citizen. Only by his acceptance
of that responsibility can we
cut down the appalling destruction
and loss of life."

Housewife Safe After Abduction

HEPPNER—(P)—Three men
charged with abducting a pretty
Portland housewife three days ago
were held in Morrow County jail
Monday, and Mrs. Margaret Have-
ly, unharmed by her captors, was
safe with her husband again.

Search for the woman and the
three men ended Sunday night in
a cabin west of Heppner where
police found the youngest of the
trio guarding the woman after the
Heppner city marshal and a deputy
arrested two in their car a few
hours earlier.

Men to Return

State Police headquarters said
the three men—James W. Neal,
24, Ernest W. Avery, 21, and Alvin
Dahl, 17—would be returned to
Portland later Monday to face
charges of abduction and robbery.

Mrs. Havey, 27, reunited with
her school teacher husband late
Sunday night at the home of Mor-
row County Sheriff C. J. Bauman,
told police she had warned off at-
tack several times by crying and
pleading with the men.

Victim Prayed

"I begged and pleaded and I
guess my tears and my prayers
protected me. For they never did
me actual harm. They never laid
hands on me," she told a newspa-
per correspondent Sunday night.

Neal and Avery were captured
by Heppner Marshal Charles Go-
million and Deputy Russell Wright
at a gasoline station. Gommillion
reported they waited at the edge of
town after State Police broadcast
that the trio was believed in the
Condon-Arlington area. The gun-
men drove into the station and Go-
million said he pulled up right be-
side them.

"They came out with their hands
up," he said.

Search for the men and the
woman centered in central Oregon
Sunday morning after police re-
ported a Cohdon store owner rec-
ognized Avery who, police said,
once worked in the district.

Chinese Girl to Speak At Campus YW Meet

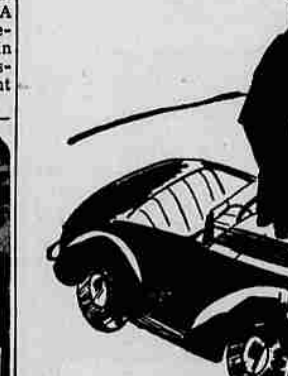
A chinese student, Miss Chang

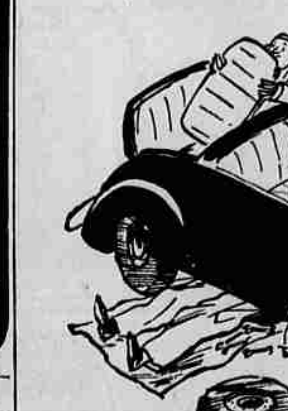

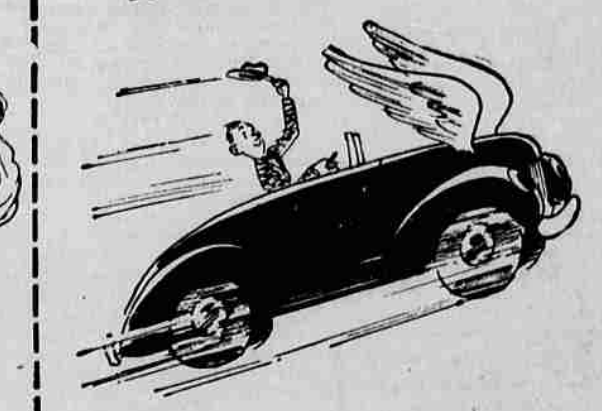
