# Cadets, Irish, Texans Tops On National Gridiron Scene

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Texas, Notre Dame and Army—the big three of college football at this stage of the campaign—face a busy afternoon next Saturday, with the Cadets taking the toughest chore of the trio.

After hurdling Villanova, Oklahoma and Cornell Army now runs smack into a powerful Michigan crew also shooting for a place among the nation's leaders.

The Cadets, playing without the injured Doc Blanchard for the second straight week, rolled over Cornell, 46-21, Saturday while Michigan stopped Iowa, 14-7, for its second Western Conference success.

Texas meets Oklahoma in their annual state fair classic at Dallas. As the Sooners were squeaking past Texas A. and M. 10-7 last week, the Longhorns crushed Oklahoma A. and M. 54-6. Notre Dame, which breezed past Pittsburgh 33-0, will be at home to take on Purdue, which absorbed a 43-7 beating by an Illinois team that lost to the Irish by 20 points the previous week.

# NFL Attracts Big Crowds

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Although baseball is overlapping into the football season, a little more than usual and there are two major professional circuits instead of one, the National Football League appears to be heading for a revision in its attendance records.

A total of 167,666 customers—third largest one-day attendance in the history of the senior league—turned out Sunday as the league's ten teams appeared on the same afternoon for the first time this year.

The New York Giants, Philadelphia Eagles and Chicago Bears, only unbeaten and untied teams in the league, chalked up their second victories of the campaign Sunday, while the defending champion Los Angeles Rams and the Washington Redskins, Eastern Division winners in 1945, found their way to the win column for the first time.

Los Angeles beat the Green Bay Packers 21-17, with a touchdown in the last six seconds. The Bears tripped the Cardinals 34-17, with three touchdowns in the last period. The Giants topped the Pittsburgh Steelers, 17-14, on Ken Strong's field goal. The Redskins nosed out Detroit 17-16, although the Lions rallied for nine points in the last quarter. And the Eagles overpowered the Boston Yanks 49-25 in the only game that didn't provide a thrilling finish.

Tommy Harmon, who scored one Los Angeles touchdown on an 88-yard runback of an intercepted pass, shared honors with the passing combination of Bob Waterfield and Jim Benton as the Rams drove 80 yards and sent Mike Holovak across from a foot out for the winning touchdown against Green Bay at Milwaukee.
