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Hugh Sherrill Services Held

HARRISBURG—Funeral services were held Monday for Hugh Sherrill, who had been associated for 88 years with the history of this community.

Mr. Sherrill, well-known to all residents of the area as a mail route carrier, died here Saturday. He was a life-long resident of the Harrisburg community.

He was born Oct. 17, 1857, on a ranch near what is now the city of Harrisburg, the oldest son of James and Mary Evans Sherrill who settled in the area in 1852. He was married in 1878 to America Hyde, and after her death was married again to Annie Louve, of Texas, who survives him.

Harrisburg's oldest native, Mr. Sherrill attended business college in Portland, and later worked for a time on his father's ranch and as a carpenter. Before taking the job as mail carrier he was employed at the Tyler-Bennett Store. For one term he served as postmaster.

For 66 years Mr. Sherrill was a member of the IOOF Lodge at Harrisburg, and was among the oldest members of the lodge in Oregon.

Until 1940 he carried mail from the depot to the post office, and was actively interested in the post office until he took ill three days before his death.

SPRINGFIELD Zoning Studied In Springfield

SPRINGFIELD—Study of a proposal to rezone portions of A and B Cts. to business classification was requested of the planning commission Monday night by the city council.

The commission was asked to determine whether rezoning of those streets and any part of East Main St. would be practicable. Councilmen have stated they are aware of the present "long and drawn out" business district, and that they would like to see the shopping area more centralized for convenience of the consumer and retailer alike.

Consider Petition

Councilmen met Monday night in an adjourned session to consider a petition for annexation signed by 100 per cent of the residents in county land between Third St. and the railroad spur, north to M St.

The city attorney was ordered to draw a resolution and ordinance calling a special election to decide the issue. Property-owners in the city, as well as residents of the area asking annexation, will cast ballots.

Election Planned

The special election probably will be held in conjunction with the Nov. 5 general election.

Also referred to the planning commission for study was the site for the proposed city hall, at Fourth and A Sts. The location was chosen several years ago and councilmen expressed a desire to obtain an up-to-date report on its practicability.

Theater Operators Ask Permit for Construction

A rain gauge at the home of Ray Boals, city water board superintendent, measured .53 of an inch of rain after the near-cloudburst which deluged city streets for a brief period about 2 p.m. Monday.

Boals, who lives at Seventeenth and Jefferson Sts., said the .53 of an inch was measured between 11:30 a.m. and 5 p.m., but pointed out that the greater portion of it must have fallen during the 10-minute downpour. The U. S. Weather Bureau at the Municipal Airport, which escaped the bulk of the downpour, measured only .17 of an inch of rain.

RENO—Mrs. Laurie Helen Cales Tuesday held a divorce from her Navy flier husband who returned home after he was listed as "officially dead" to find her married to another man.

Mrs. Cales was awarded her final divorce decree Monday from Lt. James Hedger Cales, whom she charged with mental cruelty.

In July, 1945, Mrs. Cales was notified that her husband had been killed in action off Okinawa. Two months later, she married Army Lt. Ethan P. Burnstein, of San Francisco.

Shortly after, the Navy notified her that Cales had been made a prisoner by the Japanese and was alive. Burnstein had his marriage annulled and in October, Mrs.

Cales and her husband were reconciled.

Mrs. Cales said she did not plan to remarry Cales, now discharged, "or anyone else." She said she would live permanently in Reno.
