

City Building Site to Be Talked

SPRINGFIELD—Rezononing of A and B Sits, and portions of East Main to business classifications, and the proposed location of a new city hall, probably will be studied at the planning commission meeting Friday at 7:30 p.m. in the city hall.

The commission was asked by the city council this week to study rezoning of A, B and East Main for possible business use to consolidate Springfield's one-street business section. Councilmen said they believed rezoning of these streets would increase the value of Springfield's business district, to consumer and retailer alike.

The city hall site to be studied is now being used as a city parking lot at Fourth and A Sits. Councilmen asked the study to determine if the location still is suitable for a city hall.
