

Grove Council Hears Reports

COTTAGE GROVE—Bids were received and opened on the Jake Perrin property at the city council meeting Monday evening and Mr. and Mrs. L. J. McLoughlin were awarded the place, being the highest bidder. Motorists will welcome the action taken in ordering the stop button removed from the intersection of Main and the highway. This button has seemed to be always in the way when making the turn off Main Street. Parking meters again came up for discussion and the recorder was instructed to get more data thereon.

The matter of dumping cans and refuse along the highways came before the city fathers. State police and other citizens have complained that many are throwing their cans and boxes along the highways in any convenient ditch, thus making the roadsides unsightly.

There may be newcomers or other citizens who do not know the city provides a regular dump a few miles east of Cottage Grove where persons may take their cans and junk to dump them free of charge. Also, there is complaint from the city street cleaners that leaves are being placed in the gutters. These leaves should be taken care of by the people, who should either burn them in a safe place, or have them hauled to the city dump. When left in the street, rain carries them to the drains and there they clog the gutters, leaving the water to flood the street intersections.
