

Vet CPA Stand Draws Support

Dr. Louis A. Wood, Democratic candidate for representative from the Fourth District, Sunday was on record as endorsing the Marion County Federated Veterans' Council's resolution denouncing violations of federal law with relation to veterans' emergency housing and the ignoring of CPA regulations.

A letter from Dr. Wood to Don Goode, secretary of the veterans' organization, complimented the council on its adoption of "a resolution upholding strict obedience to the terms of the veterans' emergency housing law and to the regulations with respect to building construction issued by the

Civilian Production Administration." Dr. Wood praised the stand taken by the council "in behalf of respect for the country's laws" and stated that he felt such a stand would have a "salutary effect at this time when crime is so rampant, juvenile delinquency is widespread, and a revival of love for their institutions should be demanded of our people, both young and old."

Marion County Veterans' Council officials had indicated that their resolution, passed at a meeting in Salem Friday, was an implied slap at a group of Grants Pass citizens and others, who according to press reports, had proceeded with building construction contrary to CPA regulations based on congressional authority.

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Council to Test Trainee Pupils

In an effort to ascertain whether a veteran and nonveteran apprentice are learning their chosen trades thoroughly, the Eugene Apprenticeship Council has voted to form examining committees in all trades covered by apprenticeship and vocational training agreements.

Each examining committee will be made up of four members with equal representation from labor and management. It will be the duty of the committees to determine whether proper supervision is being given the trainees by the employer-trainers.

Must Examine
In the case of a program completion by an apprentice, the examining committee must give him a final examination covering all the major processes to be learned in the trade as shown in the apprenticeship agreement. The apprentice will be promoted to the status of a qualified worker upon the recommendation of the apprenticeship council as a whole.

Members said they hoped the examining committees would make possible closer, more thorough, supervision of apprenticeship programs in the area.

An amiable amputee is George Edward Thomas of Eugene, who, 20 years after losing his left hand at the wrist, last April lost his right leg above the knee. "It don't get me down," he declares with a cheerful grin.

Loss of his hand was due to a railway accident in 1926, when he was working as a locomotive engineer in Mississippi. He stayed on the railroad in another capacity for several years, went to sea in 1937, and traveled about the world; came to Eugene six years ago to work in logging, and changed to a job at a mill log pond.

Last spring he was planning a trip to New Orleans, where he hoped to meet a son due home on furlough from the South Pacific, and had laid off work for the trip. But he dropped past the job, and finding them short-handed, helped out for a while. . . to his lasting regret!

There was an accident involving a log-deck, a power saw and Thomas, out of which came the second amputation. He's still planning his trip, as soon as he gets an artificial leg to replace present crutches. He wants to fly to Pearl Harbor, where one son is located. The other is still at Saipan, and he has seen neither for six years.
