Bridesmaid was Miss Bonnie Martin. The bride's brother, Clayton Castleberry, acted as best man.

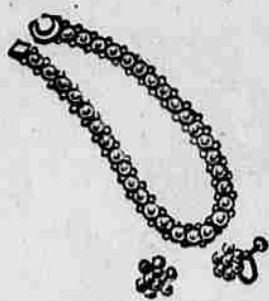
After the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Thurber left on a wedding trip along the coast and up through Washington. They are making their home in Monroe.
