'Vinegar Joe' Stilwell Served Nation as Top Fighting General

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—General Joseph W. Stilwell, 63, commander of the Sixth Army affectionately known as "Vinegar Joe" by his former American and Chinese command in Burma, died Saturday in his sleep.

His death bed the one he had said he most coveted. It was the combat infantryman's badge, which is awarded only for extended fighting at the front against the enemy.

Officials of Letterman General Hospital, which General Stilwell entered Sept. 27 for a check-up, announced that the end came quietly to the veteran campaigner.

The hard-bitten fighter, characterized by candor and known to his troops as "Uncle Joe," said after the Japanese drove his combined allied forces out of Burma in 1942:

"I claim we got a hell of a beating."

The beating was inflicted with Stilwell in the front lines. He was at the end of what General George C. Marshall termed "the thinnest supply line of all."

Disagreed With Chiang
Stilwell served as chief of staff to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, directing Chinese offensives against the Japanese until October, 1944, when major disagreements between Chiang and the American general became apparent.

Then the War Department recalled the battling veteran of China and placed him in the Pentagon Building in Washington as commander of the U. S. Army Ground Forces.

His desk failed to hold him long. Stilwell was touring Pacific battlefronts when Lt. Gen. Simon B. Buckner, Jr., was killed in action.

Succeeding Buckner as commander of the Tenth Army June 21, 1945, Stilwell drove his forces to quick completion of the Okinawa campaign.

Returning to the United States States on deactivation of the Tenth Army, Stilwell became commander of the reactivated Sixth Army Feb. 23, 1946. His command consolidated Army forces in the western part of the nation and succeeded the war-time western defense command.

Soldier's Career
Stilwell's life and talents were given to soldiering. He was born at Palatka, Fla., in 1883, and was graduated in 1904 from the U. S. military academy at West Point, where he established a record as an athlete.

The general's knowledge of China stemmed from long tours of duty in the Orient, beginning in 1920, when he went to Peiping as a language student.

He fought through major engagements in France during the first world war and received the Distinguished Service Medal. His son, Lieut. Col. Joseph W. Stilwell, Jr., pinned the Distinguished Service Cross on his father in a surprise ceremony in Chungking during World War II.

The general's widow is the former Winifred Allison Smith of Syracuse, N. Y. The surviving members of the family include his sons, Col. Stilwell, liaison officer to the Canadian army at Edmonton, Alberta, and Benjamin W., student at Stanford University; three daughters, Mrs. E. F. Easterbrook of Fort Benning, Ga.; Mrs. William E. Cox of San Francisco; and Miss Alison Stilwell of San Francisco; a brother, John, of Ardenwood, New York, and a sister, Mrs. Stuart Wilder of Newton, Conn.

Boy, 13, Finds Rock Fragments Here That Looks Oddly Like Meteorite

The discovery on College Crest of a round, blackened object about the size of a golf ball and resembling descriptions of meteorites was reported to J. Hugh Pruett, Eugene astronomer, Saturday by 13-year old John McGregor, a Woodrow Wilson Junior High School pupil.

Pruett will examine the finding this week, together with rock-like fragments which a Vancouver (Wash.) nurse picked up near Portland during last Wednesday night's sky display. The nurse said that she saw a brilliant flash of light drop to the ground and found the fragments at the impact point.

The boy said he picked up the object while walking along a newly-gravelled road in the woods near his home on Rt. 4. He said he uses the road daily and noticed the object Thursday morning because its darkened crust made it conspicuous.

Public interest in meteors has been high since the Giacobini-Zinner comet raced across the sky Wednesday night with it "tail" of millions of glowing meteors providing a brilliant display of aerial fireworks.

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US Protest Seen Pending

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Possibility that the United States will protest against the way Yugoslavia tried and convicted a Catholic prelate accused of axis collaboration was raised in diplomatic quarters Saturday.

Public concern of the State Department with handling of the case by Tito's government gave plain evidence that this country, in an apparent broadening of foreign policy, is interested now in civil as well as external affairs of other nations.

Undersecretary of State Acheson told a news conference there were "aspects" in the trial of Archbishop Alojzije Stepinac, head of the Catholic Church in Yugoslavia, which have caused "concern and deep worry."

Acheson acknowledged that his remarks were based on press reports of the trials and that no account has been received through diplomatic channels.
