

Decision on Klamath Falls Tracks 'College' Is Likely

Decision which educators and others believe will have a considerable bearing on the future of higher education in Oregon is expected to be made Sunday by the State Board of Higher Education when it decides whether to participate in the marine barracks at Klamath Falls.

The State Board of Higher Education has \$75,000 to the State of Education (not higher than \$100,000) to operate a barracks until an opportunity is offered by the State Board of Higher Education to rent or purchase a possible branch campus of higher education. Paul C. Packer, chancellor of the State System of Higher Education, was requested by the board in September to re-board in barracks and their use for higher education. Dr. Packer has announced that the report will be heard at a meeting on Oct. 13. Packer has no hint as to what the board contains or what recommendations he may make in it.

The State's work in Klamath program has been a means of taking care of a large number of students who, sponsors argued, are overflowing existing institutions. An Associated Press story published Saturday quoted Packer as praising Oregon work in caring for veter-

Airpark Gas, Oil Sales Bring Income of \$2200

A report submitted to City Manager Deane Seeger Saturday revealed that gas and oil sales at Eugene Airpark last month totaled \$2286.75. The report showed that during September 260 transient planes landed on the field. Over-night stops totaled 35; cross-country flight, 145. One hundred and fifty passengers rode in planes using the airpark, and pilots flew 1301 hours during September. Seeger said 55 airplanes are now stationed at the field.

Local USES Office Active

The U. S. Employment Service office in Eugene and its branch office on the University of Oregon campus placed more veterans on nonagricultural jobs in one month than were placed by any other USES office in Oregon with the exception of Portland.

The Oregon Veterans' Employment News, published by USES at Portland, said in its September publication that the USES offices here placed 372 veterans of both wars during August.

This figure compared with only 168 placed at Salem, 153 at Albany, 143 at Corvallis, and 201 at Klamath Falls. The Portland office placed 1114 veterans during the same month.

State Recreation Leaders Meet

Physical educators from all over Oregon gathered in Eugene Saturday to attend the first statewide meeting of the Oregon Assn. for Health, Physical Education and Recreation, at Roosevelt Junior High School.

A reception was held Saturday evening at Gerlinger Hall on the University of Oregon campus, in honor of Miss Helen Manley, senior specialist in health and physical education from the U. S. office of education in Washington, D. C., who also is president of the American Assn. for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

Saturday morning sessions featured thesis work by Mary Bowman and Ray Hendrickson, president of the state association, on the reliability of the health tests now required by state law in elementary and secondary schools.

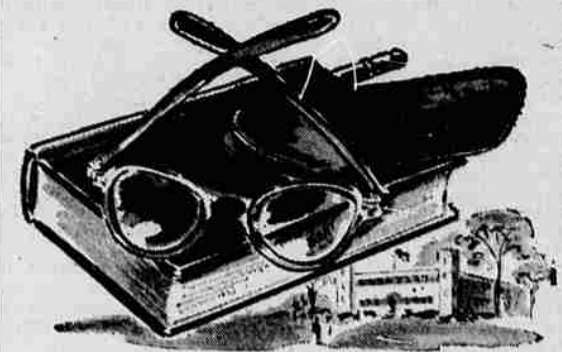
Missing Chehalis Man Sought in Eugene Area

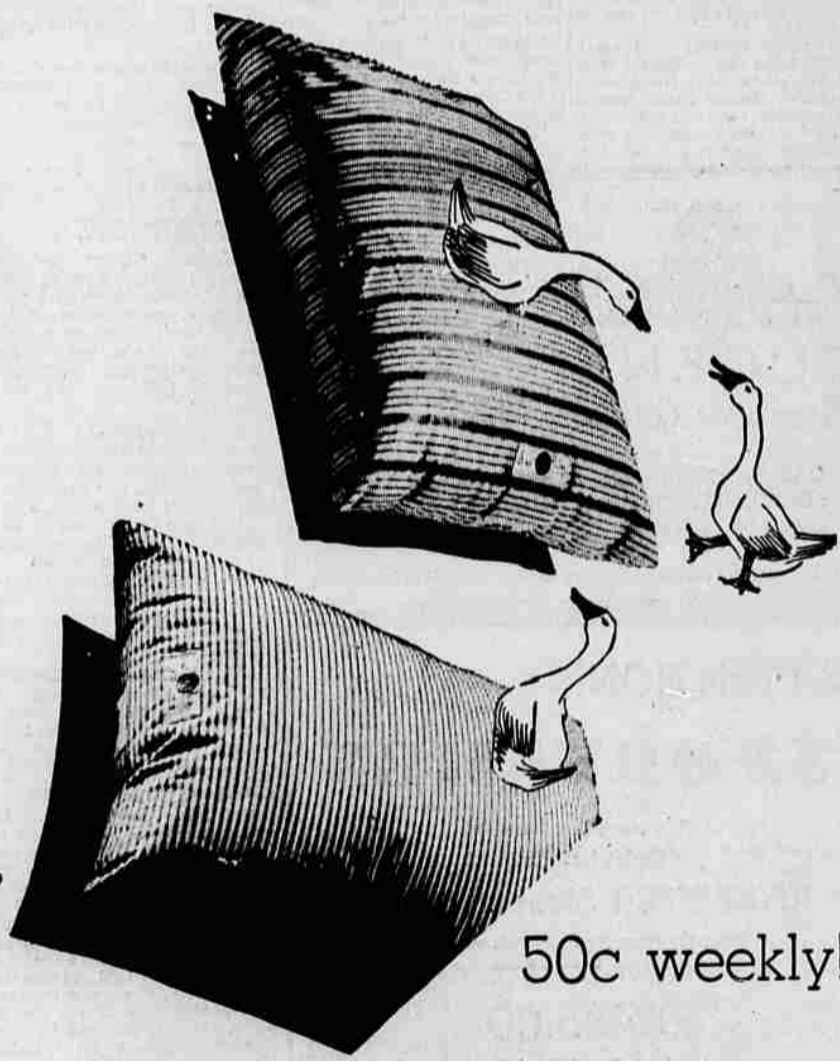
