The Eugene women will autograph copies of their book for purchasers.

"Muslin Town," a bit of Oregon history, told in narrative form, is dedicated to the parents of both writers, who were pioneers. It relates the experience of Joseph Lane and his family, the children Danny and Betsy, in a move from the Eugene City in the Willamette Valley to a new home in Eastern Oregon, a mining area. The change was necessitated by ill health of the mother, who needed to be in a drier climate at a higher altitude.

The book is one of a series planned as supplementary reading for children of grade school age. Binford & Mortz, Portland, are the publishers.

Lumber, Teamster Negotiations Continue

Negotiations for renewal of contract between the Western Retail Lumbermen's Assn., and the AFL Teamsters were at a standstill Saturday, according to D. B. McFadyen, business agent for the teamsters, after the union refused to accept a five-cent hourly wage increase offered by the lumbermen. The teamsters are asking a 25-cent wage increase, from \$1.10 per hour to \$1.35.

The contract, which expired Sept. 15, covered 75 employees including drivers, yardmen, shipping and receiving clerks and yard and truck supervisors, and involved six firms.

W. P. Riddlesbarger, attorney representing the lumbermen, said they plan to meet Wednesday for further consideration of teamster demands.

Propellor Club Names Portlander President

Auto Workers Expect To Open Contracts Soon

Negotiations for contracts between local garage and service station owners and United Auto Workers are expected to begin soon, according to union spokesmen.
