

Hitler 'Sane' Medico Believes

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—Adolf Hitler was not insane but was a "first class psychoneurotic" motivated by a sense of inferiority, Dr. Douglas M. Kelley, chief Army psychiatrist and surgeon at Nuremberg prison who returned to his home here recently, said in a story copyrighted by the San Francisco Chronicle.

"Hitler was a man whom nobody loved," Dr. Kelley said. "Nobody—that is—but" Ribbentrop,

who literally worshipped him." The San Francisco psychiatrist said his talks with ranking Nazis at Nuremberg prison indicated Hitler's rule of Germany "was a sublimation over his sense of inferiority" and that "everything he did or thought was a compensation."

Hitler had a photographic memory and "encyclopedic knowledge," Kelley said.

The dictators closest advisers told Kelley that Hitler had no perversions—that he was not a homosexual and that he did not follow astrology for his decisions.

Kelley characterized Hermann Goering as a buccaneer who could have been a hero instead of a pirate. Goering, he said, had a "classic type of extroversion" and was "an opportunist whose devotion to the Hitler cause was born of disappointment and disillusionment following World War I."

Goering believed, Kelley related, that the major mistakes of the Hitler program were mass slaughter of the Jews and the invasion of Poland. Goering considered economic liquidation of Poland and bloodless disposal of the Jews would have obtained better results.

Flood Rules Set For Springfield

SPRINGFIELD — Registration of all persons living in possible flood areas will begin immediately, it was decided Tuesday night at the first meeting of the Springfield Area Disaster Committee.

Walter Hansen, general chairman, said registration will enable rescue and relief groups to obtain some indication of the amount of work before them. Also it will aid the American Red Cross to ascertain the disposition made of those rescued.

The local committee on registration and information, headed by Allen Craig, will conduct the survey.

Residents of areas likely to be flooded also will be required to carry identification cards, to be issued by the Lane County American Red Cross, Hansen said. The cards will have to be presented if residents desire to return to their homes or businesses while the district still is under police protection.

Plans to coordinate the duties of local law enforcement agencies were made at the meeting. Hansen said that during the flood last winter there was confusion resulting from a lack of understanding on the part of residents as to the duties of each agency.

Sheriff in Charge
It was decided that the sheriff's office will be in charge of all rescue and police work, assisted by Springfield police and fire departments and authorized volunteers. Traffic control will be in the charge of state police detachments.

Housing facilities for evacuees will be in the Eugene Army and Springfield Union High School in event of another flood, Hansen reported. The Red Cross is to provide bedding and food, which will be distributed through local committees.

Operational headquarters for the disaster committee during a flood will be in the Red Cross office, 43 Eighth Ave. W., Eugene, and in the Springfield police station.

U.S. to Make Loans For German Economy

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States was off Wednesday on a "pump-priming" operation in Germany designed to put the Reich on its feet financially and eventually lift the burden of support from American taxpayers.

The program consists of a credit of several million dollars to the U. S. Military Government (AMG) in Germany by the Reconstruction Finance Corp.—an arrangement revealed in Berlin by RFC Director George Allen.

With the funds, AMG will buy raw materials for resale to German industry. AMG in turn will buy the finished export goods and sell them on the world market.

The money AMG collects from these sales will be used to repay the RFC credit. Whatever "profit" is left over will become a nest egg for AMG to buy additional raw materials.

When this fund becomes large enough, AMG expects to be able to pay all German imports, food included, without further appropriations from Congress.

Government to Sell Flax Shed, Lumber

A flax drying shed measuring 80 by 300 feet and said to contain in excess of 42,000 board feet of dimension lumber was placed on sale Wednesday by the Federal Farm Mortgage Corp.

The shed is located nine miles northwest of Eugene, a short distance southwest of the airport. The sale is being conducted through the Spokane office of the corporation and bids will be accepted until 2 p.m. Nov. 1 by T. F. Whiteman, Project Manager, Camp Adair.

In addition to the lumber, the shed contains 90 poles of eight or more inches base diameter.

Government agencies, state and local governments, and non-profit institutions have priorities. All others interested may submit offers on a competitive bid basis.

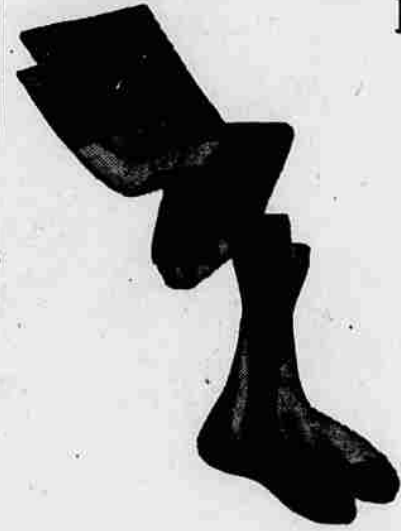
Whisky Price Unfair If Kept in New

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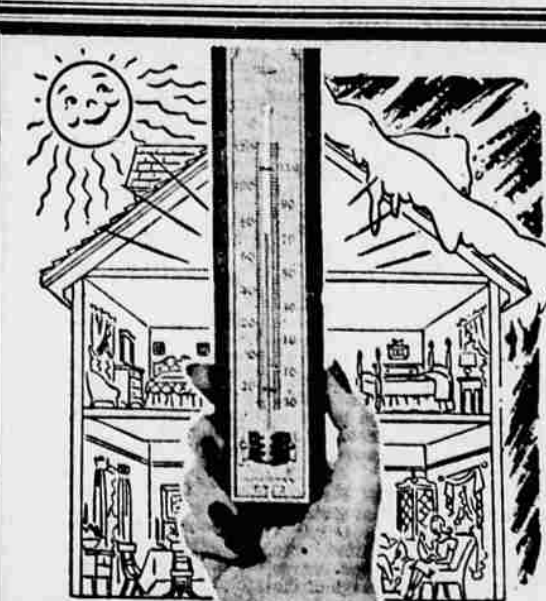
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
