Disabled Get Posts Via USES Referrals

The U. S. Employment Service
in Eugene made 41 referrals, re-
sulting in 28 placements, during
Employ The Physically Handicapped
Week Oct. 6 to 12.

Of the 41 persons referred to
jobs, 29 were veterans. Of the 28
who obtained jobs, 19 were vet-
erans.

Donald Mattson, USES manager,
said that during the first nine
months of the year the local of-
fice made 378 referrals of handi-
capped persons, resulting in 225
placements. Fully two-thirds of
all those placed on jobs since last
January have been veterans of
World War II.

An additional gift of \$275 for
the rapidly growing building fund
of Eugene's Very Little Theatre
has been received from a friend
of the late Ethel Sawyer in Cali-
fornia who read of the gift of
\$1,000 for the project from Miss
Sawyer's estate.

The building fund now stands
at \$4,275, of which \$2000 is from
earnings and savings; \$1000 from
the Sawyer estate; \$1000 from
gifts of active members, and the
\$275 from the California friend
who writes:

"It stirs me to deepest admi-
ration for that little VLT company
that has doggedly piled up its
dimes into \$7000 (cash and equip-
ment) during eighteen years. In
our town I think we had only
about 20,000 population when we
were booming with enthusiasm
over our local talent and put up a
building (according to my mind
a very bad one and expensive)
but that is apart from the fact
that people were stirred to act. I
was moved again at the account of
Ethel's years of work and wide
influence."
