Benefits of Atom Power Under Study

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The intriguing idea of harnessing atomic energy to turn western deserts into fertile farms attracted official notice here even as a new federal agency came into being to plumb the depths of scientific possibilities.

President Truman, seeking to plug the gap left when Congress adjourned without setting up a projected national science foundation, created his own presidential research board and handed it this assignment:

"To insure that the scientific personnel, training and research facilities of the nation are used most effectively in the national interest."

At its head the President placed Reconversion Director John R. Steelman.

Almost simultaneously with the White House announcement this week, Undersecretary of the Interior Oscar L. Chapman told a reporter that one of the top economists of the interior department had been discussing with him the possibilities of using atomic energy to purify sea water and then pump it inland to irrigate desert areas.

Declaring that the economist "is not a visionary," Chapman added: "He is a scientist, speaking of the scientific possibilities of this generation."

Gandhi Gives Advice As Indian Riots Start

NEW DELHI, India—(AP)—Mahandas K. Gandhi advised women in the riot-ridden areas of eastern Bengal Province to commit suicide by poison or other means to avoid dishonor.

The spiritual leader of India's Hindu-led Congress Party spoke briefly at a prayer meeting. Congress Party sources in Calcutta reported that the spreading Hindu-Muslim violence in Bengal's Tipperah and Noakhali districts had left thousands dead.

The Moslem government of Bengal said casualties were not heavy, but this was denied by Surenendra Moho Ghosh, president of the Bengal Provincial Congress Committee, who estimated that at least 5000 were dead and more than 50,000 were affected since the trouble began Oct. 10. The Bengal government would make no estimate of the casualties.

"The only effective way to bring the situation under control immediately is to bomb the areas where trouble has occurred," Ghosh declared.
