

Pittenger Warns Motorists Greater Winter Hazards

Months mean greater responsibility for his own safety in traffic," Pittenger said. Pittenger said figures recently compiled in the office of Robert S. Farrell, Jr., secretary of state, indicated that the ratio of pedestrian fatalities to all traffic fatalities increases considerably during winter months. "With traffic deaths for the first half of 1946 nearly 60 per cent



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greater than the death toll for the same period in 1945, the need for greater care in walking and driving is obvious," the chief declared. Drivers, said the chief, can do their part by yielding the right of way to pedestrians in crosswalks and by being on the alert for persons on foot in the vicinity of schools, churches and other public gathering places.

Quota Reduced
The quota in the first unit of the veterans dorms, which was temporarily increased for fall term to permit as many as possible to start the school year then, will be returned to a normal capacity of men students, housed in single, double and triple rooms.

Reservations are now being accepted for the new dormitory unit, provided the student has been admitted to the university. The start of the winter term will also see the new Quonset hut cafeteria in use, the official stated. Located between the two veterans' dormitory units, the new facility will handle 1000 men.
