

Turks Maintain Right to Straits

ANKARA —(U.P.)— Turkey rejected Soviet efforts to conduct bilateral negotiations on the Dardanelles Monday and proposed instead an international straits conference of Montreux Convention signatories, except Japan, plus the United States.

A Turkish note to Russia, replying to recent Soviet proposals, turned down the plan for joint Soviet-Turkish defense of the Dardanelles. It said Turkey considered her exchange of views with Russia, as envisaged at Potsdam, was complete.

The Turkish government said it felt Soviet fears of aggression against Russia through the straits should be allayed by the fact that United Nations forces would aid the national armies to defeat aggression from any quarter.

SALOME, Ariz. —(U.P.)— A man and woman burned to death early Monday when flames engulfed their automobile after a collision with a cattle truck, four miles west of here.

State Highway Patrolman Joe Mulcaire said an effort was being made to identify the victims through 1946 Oregon license plates on their 1941 Nash.

The collision occurred, Mulcaire said, when the passenger car attempted to pass a lumber truck, and smashed head-on into the cattle truck. The truck driver was not injured.

New York Vets End Rump Session

ALBANY, N. Y. —(U.P.)— A dramatic 23-hour seizure of the New York State Senate chamber by more than 70 World War II veterans was at an end Monday with the assurance of Governor Thomas E. Dewey that "we are doing everything we know how" to alleviate the housing shortage.

The veterans left the capitol in a defiant mood, threatening to carry their demands for an \$800,000,000 housing program into every section of the state.

Anti-American Stories Quashed in China

PEIPING—(U.P.)—Peiping newspaper publishers were ordered by the government Monday to stop printing anti-American stories.

"Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek needs the United States," the Ministry of Information told publishers. "China cannot afford to antagonize the Americans at this time."

Peiping newspapers have been giving prominent play to anti-American news, particularly stories on traffic accidents involving U. S. military vehicles and Chinese.

One paper recently commented on an accident involving the death of a Chinese: "American vehicles have been brought 10,000 miles to China for no other purpose than to kill Chinese coolies."

The order came at the peak of the Communist Party's "U. S. Army Quit China Week" campaign.

Shaw Scoffs at Idea Goering Cheated Justice

LONDON—(U.P.)—George Bernard Shaw asserted Monday that any assumption that Hermann Goering's suicide was in any sense a defeat for the victorious powers must be classed "among the insanities that war always produces."

"Had the matter been in my hands," Shaw said in a letter to the Times, "I should have supplied all the condemned men with a liberal supply of morphia tablets and given them every opportunity of sparing us the disgusting job of hanging them."
