New York Markets

NEW YORK, Oct. 21 - (AP) - Both buyers and sellers made little passes at the stock market today, with the former holding a shade the advantage, but dealings were among the slowest of the past month or so.

Neither bullish nor bearish enthusiasm was in evidence from the opening of abstractions to a point or so were in the majority. Steels attracted support at the last. Transfers for the full proceedings took place in the neighborhood of \$20,000 shares.

A rally in recently weak cotton futures as grains prospecting for stocks to some extent, brokers suggested, although gyrating commodities still provided a cautionary influence.
