

Court Upholds Local Decision on Park Use

be possible to appeal the decision to the United States Supreme Court.

Decision Quoted

The high court decision, written by Chief Justice Harry H. Bell, said:

"If the project involved herein were of a permanent nature, we should have no hesitancy to grant injunctive relief to these abutting owners. However, it is clearly established that this veteran housing project is only to be maintained during a public emergency resulting from an acute housing shortage. It is only a temporary use of the park and does not substantially or materially interfere

with the purpose for which the park was dedicated. "We apprehend that these veterans and their families—including in many instances very young babies—will be as happy to vacate these trailer homes after the emergency ends as the plaintiffs will be to have them go. "In our opinion, the only legal force and effect of the agreement—purporting to be a lease—entered into between the City of Eugene and the County of Lane and the Veterans of Foreign Wars was to permit the use of the park for this veterans' housing project during a housing emergency. When such emergency ends, and this question is primarily one for the local officials to decide, the trailer houses must be removed. In determining the question as to when the emergency is ended, the city and county must of course act in good faith and cannot capriciously or arbitrarily deprive the public of the use of the park."

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Cubs Release Jurgens

CHICAGO, Oct. 22.—(AP)—The Chicago Cubs were scouting for a shortstop today after taking 38-year-old Billy Jurgens off the active player list. Jurgens made his first appearance with the Cubs in 1931 and remained through 1938, going to the Giants in a trade. He finished the 1946 season as the No. 1 shortstop for the 1945 league leaders who finished in third place.

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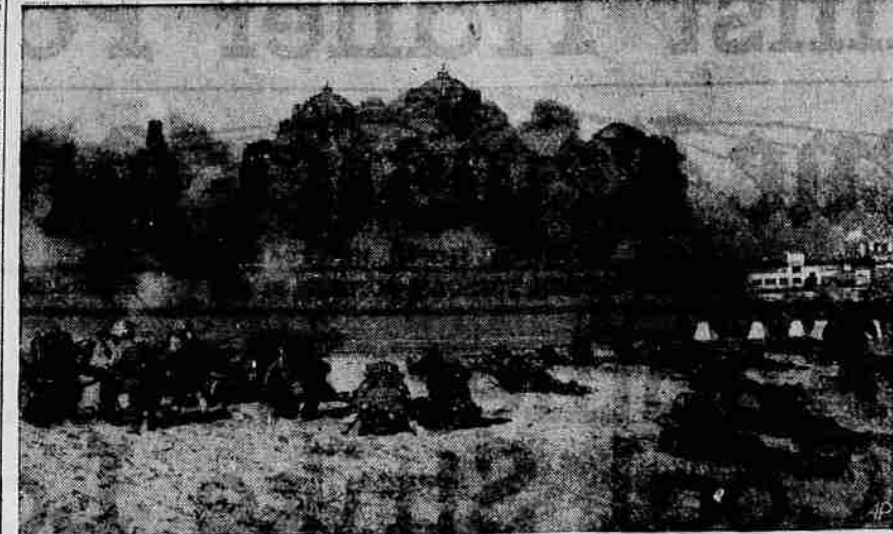

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—(AP)—A few stock leaders operated on the recovery side today while the market generally resumed its slide. A half-hearted attempt at a rally in the forenoon failed to get very far. Dealings, though, were sluggish. Selling then cropped up in steels and motors with activity expanding a bit. Volume again tapered as little support arrived and reduced extreme losses of 1 to 3 or more points. Minus signs predominated at the close. Transfers ran to around 900,000 shares. Bonds were narrow. Closing Dow-Jones averages: Industrial, 171.25, off 0.85; rail, 47.66, unchanged; utility, 34.60, off 0.31; 65 stocks, 61.67, off 0.23.
