Posters on New Housing Tell Status of Construction to Vets

No longer will veterans see houses in the process of construction and remain in doubt as to whether they are being built for rent or for sale to ex-GIs.

The Federal Housing Administration is now providing a poster

to be tacked on the side of the house which will show at a glance the intentions of the builder. The placards will be issued to the recipients of veterans' priorities with space provided for indicating the selling price or the fact that the house has been sold, if such is the case.

The first poster was tacked up in Eugene this week on a house being built by Contractor O. D. Rhoads with George Hedding, commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and member of the mayor's emergency housing committee, doing the nailing job.

Builders will be urged to use the posters, reported Charles Bayler, locality housing expediter, as they can be a boon to both home-seeking veterans and builders who wish to avoid unnecessary inquiries after a house has been sold or rented.

The poster will bear the following information: "Held for veterans during construction and 30 days after completion for sale (or rent) to veterans at a ceiling price of . . ."

Four Driving Crashes Involve Ten Vehicles

SPRINGFIELD—Four accidents Friday afternoon and Saturday morning resulted in bruises for one driver and varying degrees of damage for the 10 vehicles involved.

Bruiused was Jesse B. Cooper, Eugene Auto Court, when his vehicle collided with a car driven by D. W. Hanks, 942 F. St., at Seventh and F. Sts. Saturday morning. Police, who gave tickets to both drivers for not carrying operator's permits, said Cooper was not seriously injured, but damage to the vehicles was considerable.

Three automobiles and a truck were involved in an accident Friday evening at Sixth and Main when vehicles piled up behind J. K. Long, 631 Kelly St., as he stopped for a left-turn from Main St. Long's car and an auto driven by Helen L. Porter, Rt. 2, Springfield, were stopped when the accident occurred.

A car driven by R. T. Henaye, 229 Eighteenth St., also was stopping when it was struck by a truck driven by Harry McGee, 264 Eighth St., throwing Henaye's vehicle into the rear of the Porter car. Striking Film Workers Protest Picket Ruling

HOLLYWOOD—(U.P.)—Nearly 4000 film studio workers demonstrated Saturday against court orders limiting activities of pickets and police arrested at least 130 when their orders to disperse were disregarded.

Most of the participants were members of the Conference of Studio Unions.

Of those arrested, 35 were women, all but seven of whom had been released several hours later.

U S National Bank Promotes Houser

School Aid Bills Said Equalizers

for if you will examine the record you will find that very often it is in the areas which provide the least in education that the people elect dangerous demagogues to public office.

"And even though we may provide a higher type of education for our own children, still these demagogues help make the laws which govern us. In order to protect ourselves against this danger we need the best possible education throughout our nation.

Adjusts Taxes

"The bill, if enacted, will enable any district in Oregon to provide a good school without excessive taxes. To illustrate, the poorer of the two districts mentioned above now pays a tax of 31.5 mills.

"Under the various proposals that have been made for distributing this fund, this district would need to pay a tax of only 12 or 15 mills in order to maintain as good or better a school than it now maintains."

No Transfer

In addition to providing \$50 per census child, the bill would eliminate the two-mill tax for the state elementary school fund, and no transfer to the state school support fund would be made in any year in which the tax was levied to provide the \$50 per pupil.

Revenues from the state income tax would provide an offset to this tax, so that as long as income tax money was sufficient, the tax actually would not have to be paid by property.

However, the revenues received by each district from the pro-

posed fund would not apply as an offset to the school district tax levy nor to a county school fund levy.

The constitutional six per cent limitation would not apply and enactment of the measure by the people would constitute specific authorization for annual levy of the tax in excess of the limitation.
