

Nome Cleans Up After Gale

NOME, Alaska.—(AP)—Scarred and battered Nome Monday went about the grim business of clearing wreckage of 18 buildings destroyed or damaged during an icy gale that swept in from the Bering Sea over the weekend.

As the storm roared northward, property owners estimated their loss at between \$200,000 and \$400,000.

Six business buildings were wrecked and 12 seriously damaged. All were on the south side of Front Street, the town's main thoroughfare paralleling the waterfront. Basements were flooded in many others which withstood the pounding seas and 60-mile-an-hour winds.

For one thing Nome residents were grateful—their winter's food supply was intact and no lives were lost. A few minor injuries were reported.

Warning that the storm was approaching gave the townspeople time to form emergency crews and move merchandise and supplies from the danger area.

Damage was limited almost entirely to the business section and as a result no housing shortage is anticipated among the 1500 to 2000 wintertime residents. The native village nearby was harder hit, and several families whose dwellings were destroyed are being cared for in the native school.

As the fury of the storm increased Saturday night, towering waves smashed new steel bulkheads along the beach and pounded relentlessly against the rear of the exposed buildings.

During the hours just before midnight six structures were leveled, including the Lincoln Hotel which was half destroyed in a similar storm a year ago.

The schooner carries only river pilots, who meet all ships to pilot them across the treacherous Columbia River bar. Among those aboard was a veteran of 20 years piloting.

Admiral Predicts Sub's Preeminence

PORTLAND —(AP)—A prediction by Vice Admiral Daniel E. Barbey that underseas flotillas may be the primary fleet of the future highlighted the Navy Day observance here over the weekend.

The commander of the U.S. 4th Fleet in the Atlantic, who directed Pacific amphibious forces during the war on Japan, said the present Navy would have to do until research can improve it.

"We expect something better but haven't got it yet," he said in explaining that the underseas fleet would be protected from lethal rays of atomic bomb warfare.

Crowds jammed the decks of the U.S.S. Fall River, a heavy cruiser, and a memorial flag of flowers to the Navy dead was floated on the Willamette River by the submerging U.S.S. Catfish, a submarine, during the program. Navy planes roared across the sky.

County Nurse Leaves Post for Private Job

Miss Zula Kickbush, for two years a nurse in the Lane County Health Department, has submitted her resignation, effective Nov. 12, to the county court, Dr. A. Triolo, county health officer, announced Monday.

County Judge Clinton Hurd said that the county could do nothing but accept the resignation although the departure of Miss Kickbush will leave the health department with only two nurses. The number recommended for a county of Lane's population is eight, and the budget for the department will allow five, Triolo said.

Following her resignation, Miss Kickbush will go into private nursing.

School Equality Found Lacking

valued per child that the poorest district has.

The following table shows 1945-46 values per child:

Even Bethel, the highest in the group because of the large Southern Pacific properties in the district, is far below the state average, which the voters' pamphlet lists as \$6100.

Dr. Carl Huttaker, University of Oregon school of education, estimates that any elementary district with an assessed valuation which would equal less than \$100,000 per teacher is bankrupt; because it would not have financial ability to replace its building if necessary.

At Least 25 Below
This figure is low enough, for such a district could bond itself for only \$500 for building; but on this basis there are at least 25 elementary districts in Lane County which are well below the bankruptcy mark.

Their valuations per teacher in 1945-46 ranged from \$19,477 to \$79,800.

Enables Diversion
While the basic school support bill would not provide funds for building, it would enable such districts to divert more local tax money to construction, and all over this area, school buildings are cramped for room.

Another basis for comparison is the amount districts spend per pupil year in average daily attendance. In the districts in this immediate area in 1945-46, these figures ranged from a low of \$109.07 per pupil to \$168.42 per pupil. A student who lived in the rich district could get almost \$60 worth of more educational opportunity in a year than one living in a poor district.

Pamphlet Says
"Oregon will not tolerate the present financial confusion into which changing times have forced its schools," says the voters' pamphlet.

"Oregon people are determined that our children shall have a good, practical education. They are not interested in frills but they do want every child in the state to get the fundamentals."

Data assembled by the Oregon Tax Study Commission shows that only Arizona of the 11 western states spends less per capita for education than Oregon, says the pamphlet. In 1943-44 California spent \$165 per pupil, Washington \$147, and Oregon \$133. (Tomorrow: Opposition Arguments).

Unions Disclaim Campaign Funds

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Officers of two big AFL unions told the House Campaign Expenditures Committee Monday they have spent no money and don't propose to spend any in this year's elections.

John F. English of Indianapolis, secretary-treasurer of the International Teamsters Union, and Harry J. Steeper of Tea Neck, N.J., first assistant to the president of the American Federation of Musicians, were the witnesses.

Neither union, they testified, has spent or raised any money for political purposes, nor plans to do so, although both are opposed to some congressional candidates.

The two unions, along with the AFL garment workers and laundry workers unions had refused to supply in writing the answers to committee questions dealing with the source of their income and their political plans.

Grounds for Refusal
Joseph A. Padway, AFL counsel, told the committee he had advised the unions not to answer the questions because they violated the right of individuals or groups to have freedom in voting for whom they chose. He said the unions do not object to telling what they already have done, adding:

"It hardly comports with concepts of freedom of choice and the secrecy of the ballot for any person or any organization to be required to make advance disclosure of its future intentions respecting candidates they will support and vote for."
