Speaker Cites Ethical Views

"The physical pain and price of the atomic bomb are being paid for by the men and women of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, but the ethical price is yet to be paid by the men and women and children of America," declared Dr. Buell Gallagher of Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, Cal., Sunday evening when he addressed the opening assembly of Religious Emphasis Week on the campus of the University of Oregon.

Dr. Gallagher, one of 13 speakers on the campus for the week-long observance, said that the effort to bring under ethical control a practice which "is essentially unethical" is as absurd as to condemn murder by poisoning or slow torture, but to condone murder by malnutrition and starvation.

"Show me a man who today believes in the use of the war method and the premises of national sovereignty," he asserted, "and I will show you a man who is either a complete and impractical romanticist, or else one who, knowing the facts, is a sadist who believes in race suicide."

Landlords May Go to Court

SEATTLE—U.P.—Seattle landlords may force a test-case of power of state law to block their anti-OPA "no-rent" strike, President John R. Totten, Pioneer Apartment Owner Group, said Monday.

Totten and city apartment building owners were warned Saturday they risked criminal conspiracy charges under state statutes by persisting in refusing to rent vacant apartments.

"Scattered, unorganized landlords have been closing apartments as vacated for some time, rather than trying to operate them under inadequate ceiling rents," Totten said in reply to Shoret, warning arrests would follow if the PAG or individual owners persisted in refusal to rent.

Totten insisted that the no-rent strike started long before the PAG formally adopted the program last week, and announced plans to call for nationwide apartment owners strike against OPA rent ceilings.

A special PAG meeting has been called for mid-week, Totten said.

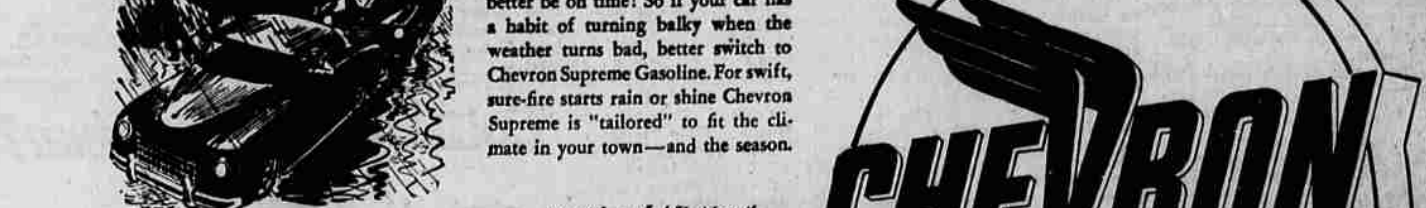
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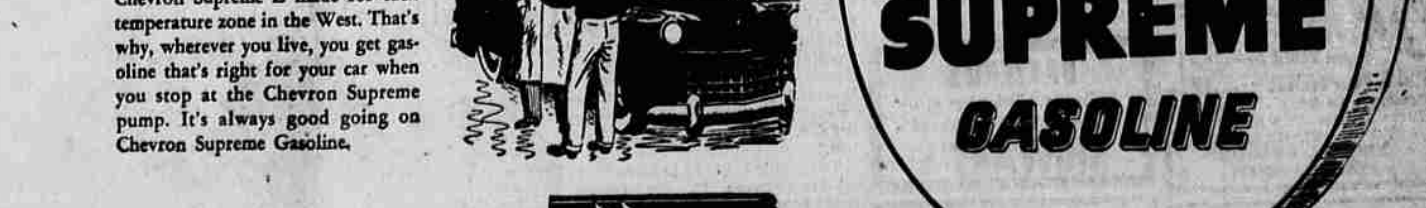
