Grand Jury Charges Murder of Stockman
ONTARIO, Ore. — (AP) — A Malheur County grand jury Wednesday night returned two indictments charging Mrs. Gladys Lincoln Broadhurst, 40, and her cowboy chauffeur, Alvin Lee Williams, 23, with first degree murder in the shotgun killing of her husband W. D. (Doc) Broadhurst, 51, well-to-do stockman.
District Attorney E. Otis Smith said "We will send out extradition papers tomorrow" for the transfer to Oregon of Mrs. Broadhurst, held in Caldwell, Idaho, jail 50 miles east of here.
The indictments by the grand jury confirmed Smith's earlier action in filing charges against the pair. Smith said both indictments charge Williams and Mrs. Broadhurst with "willful, purposeful intent and deliberate, premeditated malice in killing" her husband. In addition, Smith said, the indictment against Mrs. Broadhurst said that before the slaying "she aided and abetted" Williams.
Broadhurst was killed while driving from his Caldwell dairy farm to his Jordan Valley, Ore., ranch.

Wood Opposes Lumber Moves
Dr. Louis A. Wood, Democratic candidate for Congress from the Fourth district, was on record Wednesday with 200 lumber dealers in the Eugene area as opposing the current moves by the Forest Service and the O & C Administration toward negotiating cooperative agreements.
"I believe," Dr. Wood wrote, "that the move should be definitely halted, and that after exhaustive investigation a new forestry program should be evolved with the intention of establishing a reign of plenty rather than of scarcity in the wood industry."
"All forest lands, whether public or private, within a sustained yield unit, should be supervised on the principle of sustained yield. I stand for a program that would call for greater conservation and utilization of our forests and that would allow an equitable participation of all operators, whether large or small, in this sustained yield program, with the opportunity to share in the timber on the government's reserve lands depending upon location and ability to do a good job of forestry."
Wood claimed in his letter that the federal government's forest program, in attempting to put into effect a cooperative management basis relative to the harvesting of northwest timber, "is economically unsound and detrimental to the vast majority of producers and distributors of wood products, dependent communities and workers in the associated industries."

Oregon Society Writer Dies from Heart Attack
PORTLAND — (AP) — Mrs. Charles Mead French, Portland and former Astoria newspaper woman, died here of a heart attack Monday night.
The former Jane Page Lagasse, she was a native of Astoria, where she was society editor of the Astorian Budget before coming to the Oregonian in 1940. She was a 1938 graduate of the University of Oregon.
She is survived by her husband, Charles Mead French of Portland, to whom she was married in 1941; and her mother, Mrs. D. E. Lagasse, Portland.
Funeral services will be conducted at 2:30 p. m. Thursday at the J. P. Finley & Son Mortuary here.

Bus Line's Application Gets ICC Hearings
PORTLAND — (AP) — An Interstate Commerce Commission late Tuesday took under advisement an application to link Oregon coastal cities with a new bus line between Portland and San Francisco over the Oregon coast highway.
A hearing was held here on the application filed by the American Buses, which now operates transcontinental service from San Diego, Los Angeles and San Francisco.
While other bus lines opposed the application, it was supported by a delegation from Oregon towns coming here in one of the company's new 37-passenger buses. They were from Newport, Bandon, Coquille, North Bend, Coos Bay, Port Orford, Gold Beach, Florence, Depoe Bay, Waldport and Delake.

Attorney Rules City May Eliminate Post
Attorney General George Neuner ruled in Salem Wednesday that the job of vice-principal for University High School may be eliminated by the Eugene school district, regardless of the teacher tenure law.
The ruling was requested by Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, regarding the employment of Mrs. Mildred Williams as vice-principal at the school.
The school district reportedly did not want to hire Mrs. Williams unless it was established that her job could be eliminated when the proposed new high school is built.
The district will eliminate University High School at that time and will have a sufficient number of vice-principals already employed at Eugene High School. Under the teacher tenure law, the district would have had to keep Mrs. Williams in that position. She is a former vice-principal at Roosevelt School.

Teamster Wage Offer Placed at \$1.20 Hourly
W. P. Riddlesbarger, attorney for the Western Retail Lumbermen's Assn., stated Wednesday that he wished to correct the impression given Tuesday that the lumbermen had offered teamster employees \$1.23 per hour "and then welched three cents on a technicality."
Riddlesbarger explained that a misunderstanding between himself and D. B. McFadyen, teamsters' business agent, was responsible for the statement that \$1.23 per hour had been offered, "when it's a fact that the equipment driven by lumbermen employees is only heavy enough to warrant the \$1.20 scale, and that is all we offered them."
