

Millar Stresses Liberty Needs

"There can be no personal liberty without social responsibility," Dr. James Millar, lecturer for the Good Citizenship Foundation, told Chamber of Commerce members and their guests at the Friday forum meeting in the Eugene Hotel.

The old "jungle idea of liberty" has given way to the "live and let live" attitude, Millar said, but he added that "one further step is needed"—that which will carry us to the idea of "live and help live."

Interlinked
Dr. Millar called the world today "an organism, so constituted that whatever happens in one part, sooner or later makes itself felt in every other part. As long as there are no standards of living exist anywhere in the world, those standards threaten our economic life," Dr. Millar warned.

Government subsidies, doles, and other forms of aid were blamed by Dr. Millar for having contributed to the "loss of self reliance" among the people of the United States.

"We must recapture this feeling of self reliance," he said, "and combine it with self control, self respect, and self sacrifice. These are the tools we need to use if we are ever to be assured of a peaceful world."

"Peace," he concluded, "is at least as costly as war, and a generation of responsible citizenship is the most important factor for this peace."

Tacoma Transit Strike Ended by AFL Union

TACOMA, Wash. — (AP) — End of Tacoma's 32-day-old transit bus strike came Friday following a mass meeting of members of the Motor Coach Employees Union (AFL).

Union Business Agent R. A. Cribbs ordered drivers and maintenance men back on the jobs immediately, with complete bus service expected to be resumed by Saturday morning at the latest.

Terms of the agreement which ended the strike by 350 drivers and maintenance men which idled 110 buses were to be issued later Friday by union officials and the Tacoma Transit Co.

Mello Franco May Leave Coast Harbor

COOS BAY — (AP) — Possibility that the Mello Franco, whose presence here has tied up the port of Coos Bay since June 30, might leave in the near future was seen here with the arrival Friday morning of Captain R. Brillard and 10 French sailors and the expected arrival of a group of U. S. Maritime Commission representatives.

A jurisdictional dispute between CIO and AFL maritime unions over manning of the ship has barred American ships from the port for the last four months. The Maritime Commission group is to inventory the supplies on board the Mello Franco as part of the formalities of taking the ship back from the American Pacific Steamship Co. and turning the ship over to the French crew under the deal providing for the sale of a large number of Liberty ships to the French government.

The inventory is expected to take three or four days after which at least two more days will be needed to ready the ship for sailing.

Court to Ponder Jap War Steps

TOKYO — (AP) — The war crimes prosecution Friday opened the climactic phase of its case against 27 leading Japanese defendants with disclosure of Japan's preparations for the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor that signaled the beginning of her most brazen attempt at conquest.

This was the part of the long trial that was expected to furnish the most damaging prosecution evidence against balding Hideki Tojo who became premier two months before Pearl Harbor and was Japan's wartime leader until after the invasion of Saipan in July, 1944.

Associate Prosecutor Carlisle W. Higgins, Winston-Salem, N. C., said the prosecution will present evidence from records of Cabinet and Privy Council meetings and captured Japanese Army and Navy documents. This evidence, he said, will show:

1—President Roosevelt's triple priority telegram to Emperor Hirohito, which might have changed the course of history, was delivered to U. S. Ambassador Joseph Grew in Tokyo 10 1/2 hours late. This, he said, was due to deliberate orders given Japanese postal authorities to delay all such messages.

2—Former Foreign Minister Shigenori Togo, a defendant, lied to Grew about the time he gave the President's message to the Emperor.

3—Tojo and some other defendants took part Nov. 5, 1941 at an imperial conference where it was formally decided to begin hostilities against America, Britain and The Netherlands "as soon after Nov. 25 as preparations could be completed."

4—On Nov. 5, Combined Fleet Top Secret Operation Order No. 1 providing for the attack on Pearl Harbor was issued. Two days later came the order setting the exact day of the attack.

LOS ANGELES' VIOLENCE

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Despite city-sponsored parties which drew 250,000 youngsters to 52 playgrounds, weary police wrote off Halloween Friday as the most violent in years.

Most of the damage occurred in residential Los Angeles and its suburbs. Scores of homes, schools and store windows were broken; two attempts to set houses afire were quelled without serious damage; dozens of cars and houses were splashed with red paint.

PIRATES BOARD VESSEL

CANTON — (AP) — Four persons were reported Friday to have been killed and seven wounded by a band of 15 Chinese pirates who boarded a Canton-Wuchow passenger vessel, engaged in a gun fight with the crew and made off with a fortune in Chinese currency.

TRAIN WRECK KILLS 11

JESUS CARRANZA, Mex. — (AP) — Railway officials reported at least 11 persons were killed and 50 injured when two passenger trains collided Friday on the Tehuantepec Peninsula line at La Mata, near the Pacific port of Salina Cruz.

REPRESENTATION ASKED

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Netherlands, Belgium and Luxembourg Friday served notice on the Big Four that they want to be represented at the foreign ministers meeting that will draft the German peace treaty.
