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Glenwood Asks Change in Road

Alterations involving establish-
 ment of a left turn at the Spring-
 field bridge and widening of the
 present left turn into the south-
 bound traffic lane were asked
 Monday night at a meeting of the
 recently-organized Glenwood Busi-
 nessmen's Assn.
 It was pointed out by S. G.
 Hatch, chairman of Monday's
 meeting, that cars from the south
 desiring to stop at the trading cen-
 ter on the north side of the high-
 way, west of the bridge are forced
 to drive over the bridge into
 Springfield and then return.

See Inadequacy
 The statement was made at the
 meeting that the circle installed
 in the triangle to facilitate north
 and southbound traffic is inade-
 quate for large trucks and that it
 is awkwardly placed for the Glen-
 wood district.

Other suggestions included the
 installation of stop lights at Mis-
 sissippi, Henderson and Brooklyn
 Streets, on Pacific Highway South,
 and a decrease in the size of the
 traffic island

Appreciate Problem
 "Merchants of the Glenwood dis-
 trict have long appreciated the
 parking problem in Glenwood,"
 said M. L. Gans, owner of the
 Super Y Market at the junction.
 "The district is one of the busi-
 est retail commercial districts in
 Oregon—and in addition, there is
 a heavy highway traffic load to
 take care of. The merchants have,
 where necessary, provided private
 parking lots, so as to take the
 cars off the highway.

Want Facility
 "We maintain that people
 should be permitted to reach our
 places of business as easily as they
 do our competitors on all sides of
 us."

A committee consisting of Pat
 Patterson, Walter Steen and Earl
 James was named by Ben Merwin,
 acting chairman for the next
 meeting Nov. 11, to meet with
 representatives of the highway de-
 partment to attempt to work out
 a solution of the problem.
