Los Angeles Infants Stricken by Disease

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—Baffled health authorities admitted Friday that a mysterious infant diarrhea which already has killed four babies and stricken 53 more may shortly reach epidemic proportions.

Specialists took charge of general hospital isolation wards where the infants are being treated in an effort to determine the cause of the malady.

Latest fatality from the disease was an unnamed two-and-a-half-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest M. Enriquez.

Of the babies hospitalized, 11 were admitted overnight.

IST May Take Feed to Alaska

SEATTLE—(AP)—Efforts of the Thirteenth Naval District to secure authorization to ship 1000 tons of stockfeed to Alaska aboard an LST were revealed Friday by district headquarters spokesmen even as a Third Army supply ship became entangled in the operator-unit dispute which has tied up proposed sailings of the Army relief ship to Alaska, the SS Grommet Reiter.

The move to send the stockfeed north by LST followed territorial Governor Gruening's report to President Truman that dairymen may have to start slaughtering their milk cows soon.

The governor, who passed through Seattle Thursday night en route by plane to Washington, D.C., said he would seek a personal interview with the President, to bring relief to Alaska.

"The strike has seriously affected every phase of Alaskan life—business, industry, labor. It is wrecking Alaska's entire economy. Alaskans must have relief."

The latest Army supply ship to become tied up in dispute was the Palisana.

New Grocery Store To Open on Monday

Stanley Grocery store at Sixteenth and Willamette Sts. will open Monday with a complete line of foods in five different departments.

The new store is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Clive Stanley, grocers in Eugene and Springfield for the past 20 years. Although they now own only one store, they have owned as many as four at one time, at 128 East Broadway and Olive, Charnelton Sts., and at Main in Springfield.

The Stanleys will operate a grocery department of the store, with Mr. Stanley, George C. as buyers. All departments have been operated by Mr. Stanley. Cecil Atkins is in charge of the bakery; William Eads is in charge of the vegetable department; the meat department is operated by Melvin and Archie Lewis, and by Lester Heston.

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Data Given

Other data and developments included in Wyatt's report were:

Continued increase in the production of most housing materials, with lumber reaching 3.45 billion board feet in August, surpassing the war peaks and setting the highest record since 1929.

Agreements on the first three guaranteed market contracts for production of a total of 36,900 assembly line houses, opening the way for expanded output next year of industrialized housing.

A total of \$385 million in residential construction put in place in September, the highest for any single month since the boom years of the twenties.

A further rise during September in residential site construction employment, while employment on non-residential buildings declined slightly.

Announcement of two new premium payments, one to increase the supply of nails and the other for sand-lime brick.

More Priority

Further priority aid, more items set aside for housing and priorities on some items, including lumber and nails, made extendible to the supplier or producer to insure more adequate supplies and better distribution among dealers.

Escapes from Mental Hospital Recaptured

BRENTWOOD, N. Y. — (AP)—Four mental patients with "definite homicidal tendencies" were captured and returned Friday to the Mason General Hospital from which they escaped by overpowering two wardens.

Bright targets in the red bathrobes and pajamas issued in veterans' hospitals, the patients—three Negro war veterans and a German prisoner of war—had only a few short hours of freedom on the rain-drenched south shore of Long Island.

State police who captured three of the patients, two of the American veterans and the Nazi prisoner, said they looked like "dead crows" when they surrendered meekly. Their bathrobes were wet and dirty and the men were exhausted.

Federal Payrolls Cut by One-Quarter

WASHINGTON — (AP)—There were 2,154,000 federal employees in this country on Oct. 1, a reduction of 26 per cent since July 1, 1945, the Civil Service Commission has reported.

During the same period, the number of federal workers overseas dropped from 854,000 to 310,000.

In the year ended July 1, 1946, the commission said, the government's domestic payroll was cut to \$5,000,000,000 annually, a reduction of \$2,000,000,000.

The federal roster was cut by from 60,000 to 70,000 workers in each of California, New York and Pennsylvania, accounting for almost one third of the reduction for the entire country, the commission said.

Circuit Court to Hear Mrs. Henagin's Plea

OREGON CITY — (AP)—Mrs. Luella Henagin, 46, charged with first degree murder in the death of her husband, will be arraigned before Circuit Judge Earl C. Latourette next Tuesday.

The husband, Robert L. Henagin, 41, superintendent of West Linn schools, died Oct. 30 of two 22 caliber pistol bullet wounds which he accused Mrs. Henagin of firing.

The Clackamas County grand jury returned the murder indictment Thursday. Trial date is expected to be set at the arraignment.

Mrs. Henagin's attorney, P. K. Hammond, said she would plead self-defense.

Married 'Wolves' Meet Frustration via Guide

In addition to marital status markings, the directory includes a calendar of social events for the school year, an academic schedule, pep yells, school songs, and a faculty section.

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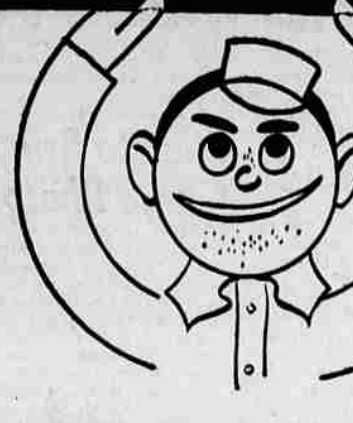
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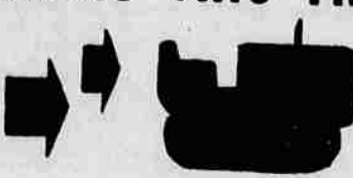
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Politico Fight Still Puzzles
