

Springfield Chamber Told Of Civic Center, By-Pass Road

SPRINGFIELD — Eyer W. Brown, associate professor of architecture at the University of Oregon, and W. S. Fort, Springfield city attorney, presented to the immediate problems facing this city to members of the Chamber of Commerce at a meeting Wednesday.

Brown, also a member of the Springfield Planning Commission, stressed the need of new civic buildings and the value of having them centrally located in a civic center. Fort presented the tentative proposals for highway development to ease Main St. congestion.

Town 'Land Poor'
Springfield's main trouble, Brown said, is that it is "land poor"—does not have enough

adequately located city property. Additional sticklers in any plans for civic development are the six per cent tax limitation and the manner in which the city developed, Brown said.

He urged that the city "devise ways to get the town growth centralized to get higher unit value." Civic buildings are a natural focal point for any city, he said. A well-planned and well-located civic center would tend to attract future development, he emphasized.

New Buildings Needed

A new fire station and city hall are urgent needs, Brown said. "In a sense," he added, "there is a moral obligation eventually to provide a city library adequate to Springfield's needs." If possible, Brown said, a site for a new post-office should be provided. A good postoffice location would increase the value of a civic center, he declared, but if the government were to build where expedience permitted it would not contribute to either value nor appearance.

(Springfield now is on a post-office department list for a \$95,000 federal building. The list probably will be submitted to Congress next session with legislation approving the first construction of federal buildings since before the war.)

Brown urged Chamber members and other residents of the city to consider a civic center proposal, which he said would add to value and appearance of Springfield.

By-Pass Plan
Discussion of the proposed by-pass route on South A St. followed the architect's presentation of civic center plans, with Fort explaining two preliminary sketches of the highway development.

The drawings, prepared by the Central Lane Planning Council, propose the opening of South A St. to allow through traffic to by-pass Main St. Fort emphasized the proposal is a long way from becoming official since a "great deal of study is essential in order to determine what appears to be the best plan."

"South A is a waste space," Fort said. "The city gets no benefit from it, but Springfield is fortunate in having this undeveloped property adjacent to its business district. These sketches provide parking space for several hundred cars immediately in the business area. I know of no other city that has undeveloped property so well located."

Since any route constructed would become a state highway, the city attorney urged the city to cooperate to the fullest extent with the state highway commission in development of plans.

'Dream-Test' Favors 'Papa'

CHICAGO — (U.P.) — Persons who marry the man or woman of their dreams are more likely to be happy than those who have to take what they can get, sociologist Anselm Strauss says. Strauss, Indiana University sociologist, arrived at his romantic conclusion scientifically. He questioned 373 engaged or recently married persons to find out whether their dreams materialized or turned into nightmares.

Most Had Idea Beforehand
In an article in the American Journal of Sociology, published by the University of Chicago, Strauss said he had found that 80 per cent had an idea beforehand of what they wanted in the way of a mate.

Fifty-nine per cent of those questioned got just about what they were looking for. He didn't reveal the content of the 41 per cent who got gyped.

Some of the persons said they could actually visualize the person of their dreams. They were more interested in temperament and cultural traits than in physical appearance, however.

Women were less interested in getting good looking mates than were the men. The men weren't as interested in race, religion, education or social background as they were in beauty.

They also were quite emphatic in ruling out of their dreams any woman who held opposing political views. Strauss added that the ideal person might be linked with home life and the dreamer's own personality.

"Frequently a woman chooses a man who resembles her father in personality and who consequently comes close to satisfying her ideal—built on a father's quality," she said.

Indies Decision Reached Swiftly

SAN FRANCISCO — (U.P.) — It took less than a week for a "possible basis of agreement" to be reached in the strife-torn Netherlands Indies since a vital concession was made by the Dutch government at The Hague.

This was the decision, taken on Nov. 7, to recognize the "political reality" of the tough-talking president of the unrecognized republic of Indonesia, Dr. Soekarno.

If the basis of agreement reached this week at Cheribon, on Java, can be carried out, peace will come to 70,000,000 Indonesians after 15 months of political deadlock, economic paralysis, and bloody strife that has cost thousands of lives.

Like all plans where established empires relax their hold on a colony, independence-seeking colonialism, this settlement is complicated. But in principle, it is simple. The Dutch recognize the right of Indonesians to be free if they want to. The Indonesians recognize that for some time they cannot stand alone.

This is the reasonable meeting ground that might have been reached quickly after V-J Day had not Japan planned expertly on post-war chaos, and if both Indonesians and Dutch tempers had not been short.

An element in Holland—said to be a minority including some big business interests—took the view that the Indies belonged to Holland, period. In the Indies, the Nationalists were intent on full independence and suspected anything short of that. British occupation and the necessity of using Japanese troops to keep order made things worse.

Neuner Rules Out School-Union Relation

SALEM — (U.P.) — School boards cannot deal with labor unions in which their employees are members, Attorney General George Neuner ruled Thursday in a far-reaching opinion.

The attorney general, in an opinion for Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, said a school board "has no authority in law to enter into any contractual relationship, or do any bargaining, with any third party or body representing janitors and maintenance workers it may employ."

The issue was raised when building service employees and maintenance men employed by School District 16, Umatilla County, selected the Building Service Employees Union, Local 49, to represent them for bargaining. The directors of the district asked if they had power to bargain.
