

Educators Point To Moral Goals

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...way of living for their fellow men."

The report goes on to say, "This note of warning leads to another objective which, in our opinion for veterans, must not be overlooked. The young high school graduate in the next few years, who may or may not be a veteran, ... threatens to be our 'forgotten man.' There is real danger that these able youngsters may find themselves actually crowded out of the higher-educational system."

"If and when they succeed in entering a college, they will face competition with more mature minds, and when they complete their college education they will face competition with those who have preferred status in many types of employment. It may be that this younger generation will need some of the best educational counsel. Certain it is that educational opportunities should not be denied them in the years ahead. Many Students Older

(The report explains that many of the veterans in college now are 21 years old or older and that many also have had technical training in the service, on which

they are building greater proficiency.)

"... The next decade will witness a tremendous increase in the number of college-trained individuals. ... The established personnel and placement agencies in Oregon's institutions will require encouragement, expansion, and adequate funds if the challenge ahead of them is to be adequately met."

War Record Told

These observations are contained in the part of the report dealing with war service of the institutions and with the problems of readjustment for peace. The report recalls that in the war period:

1. Approximately 16,000 alumni and former students answered the call to arms.

2. In a three-year period 7200 men in military service received training on four campuses of the state system.

3. The institutions were able to mobilize their complete educational facilities to meet demands of the armed forces for technical training.

4. Approximately 200 faculty members took leave to serve in the armed forces or in other war activities.

5. Significant war research and other vital war projects were conducted on the campuses.

6. Cities faced with new burdens as a result of marked population growth received expert aid from the Bureau of Municipal Research at the university here.

In the field of postwar problems the report says that:

1. Experience in other areas, and mathematical correlations indicate that by 1960 or in 20 years enrollments may rise as high as 25,000 in the state's seven higher-educational institutions. The peak may come in 1948.

2. Because of soaring costs it appears that stabilization of the building construction market will be awaited before proceeding with the permanent dormitory-building program.

3. A problem is faced in recruiting adequate faculty and the only solution "in this period of mounting enrollments is a higher salary standard."

4. Equipment in most institutions is obsolete and an effective job in the decade ahead will require large acquisitions.

Salem Artist Takes Poison to End Life

SALEM — (AP) — Russell Waterman Frost, 51, Salem industrial designer and artist, ended his life Sunday night by taking poison, Coroner L. E. Barrick said Monday.

Police first had suspected murder because of stab wounds on Frost's body and because Frost had made a statement before his death that someone had been trying to get a formula away from him.

Police said there were stab wounds on the arm and wrist and scratches on his hands. Officers arrived before Frost died.
