

# Weather Bureau Predicts 11 Feet Early Tomorrow

Summit reported snow remained only on a three-mile stretch near the summit.

The State Highway Department and U. S. Weather Bureau said a new storm was expected Tuesday night, bringing moderate rains in the valley and moderate to heavy rains in the mountains, with snow above

the 4500-foot elevations. Flood stage at Leaburg was reached Tuesday morning with a crest of 13.9 feet, but no damage was reported. At Row River approaches to the steel bridge were made impassable by water as flood stage reached that community at the bridge site.

At Lowell schools closed when only four of seven school buses could negotiate flooded roads. The bus from up the Willamette met four feet of water on the road and turned back, while the Dinberry bus was halted by a slide, water and a stump in the road. Fall Creek bus driver reported two or more feet of water over the road just below Fall Creek.

Lowland cabins near the Willamette River bridge near Lowell were reported only two feet above the rising water Tuesday morning, and delivery trucks from Eugene were using the Dexter route back to Eugene instead of Fall Creek for fear of high water.

At Cottage Grove extra chlorine was added to city water Tuesday and residents of the area were advised to boil all drinking water after surface water was washed into reservoirs by the rains.

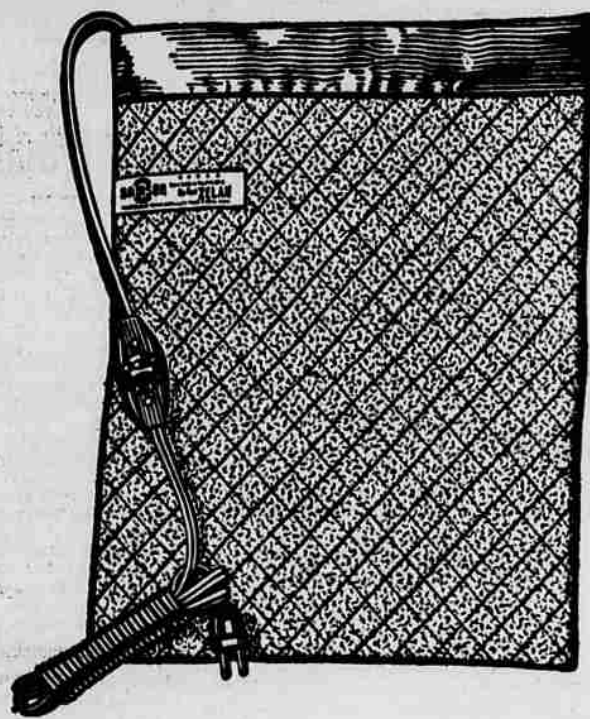

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the Amazon, but that closing of that street would probably not be necessary. Unless an extremely heavy downpour of rain continued during the afternoon, Nineteenth St. was scheduled to reopen Tuesday evening.

City officials were deluged with calls from home owners whose sewers were overloaded

Tuesday, and 12 regular street department employees and 4 extra workmen spent the day working on sewers and flooded streets.

Heavy rain evidently scared out-of-town students at the University of Oregon Tuesday also, as many left early for Thanksgiving vacations in order to avoid the possibility of flooded highways north and south.

In a 24-hour period ending at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday, 1.88 inches of rain fell at Eugene, bringing total precipitation for the month to 7.81 inches. Normal total rainfall for November is 5.89 inches. The Willamette River at Eugene rose more than five feet in 12 hours, from a plus 2.08 reading Monday evening to a plus 7.5 reading at 7:30 a. m. Tuesday. Rises continued to 8.6 feet at 8:30 a. m., 9 feet at 9:15 a. m., 9.1 feet at 10 a. m. and 9.17 feet at noon Tuesday.

Reports from south of Eugene said that Willamette Park ballroom was surrounded by water, but that no flood is evident in Springfield.

## Russian Radio Says China Hurts Workers

TOKYO—(U.P.)—Khabarovsk Radio, in a broadcast monitored by a Japanese news agency, charged Tuesday that Chinese Nationalist troops and policemen have committed "indescribable" violence against Soviet railway workers in Mukden.

The broadcast said that 400 Russian workers were about to leave Mukden as the result of repeated diplomatic protests.

Radio Khabarovsk said that Chinese police in Mukden failed to give Soviet nationals legal protection and in addition had made numerous illegal arrests and confiscations of Soviet property.

## Man-Caused Fires In Forests Decrease

PORTLAND—(U.P.)—Forest fire reports for 1946 from the 19 national forests of the North Pacific region in Oregon and Washington show a sharp decrease in numbers of man-caused fires, and acreage burned, and a slight increase in lightning fires, figures released Tuesday by the U.S. regional forester's office, Portland, disclosed.

A total of 288 man-caused fires were reported for 1946, as compared with 418 in 1945. Smokers' fires dropped from 208 in 1945 to 137 in 1946; campers' from 80 to 76; lumbering from 24 to 17; and other miscellaneous from 106 to 58.

Acreage burned shows a striking reduction, with 9589 acres for 1946, as against 27,806 in the bad fire year of 1945.

## Plywood Premium Pay to Be Replaced

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Housing Expediter Wilson W. Wyatt announced Monday night that his agency would abandon the premium payment plan on softwood plywood and substitute another plan to increase production.

The nature of the substitute was not revealed but there were reports that a straight incentive payment plan, such as is employed in other building material fields, would be used.

Wyatt said price decontrol necessitated the change. He also announced that the uncertainty of market conditions had necessitated a cancellation of plans for a premium payment operation on fir millwork. He said production of this material would be observed closely and if it appears that premium payments will stimulate production, the incentive program will be considered again.

## Solon Urges Probe Of Sugar Situation

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Rep. August H. Andresen (R-Minn.) said Tuesday he will insist on a sugar investigation by the new Congress and predicted it would result in "some outstanding revelations."

Andresen, the ranking Republican member of the House Agriculture Committee behind the likely new chairman, Rep. Hope (R-Kan.), declined to amplify what he expected a probe would produce.

"What I am primarily interested in," he told a reporter, "is to have an increased supply of sugar for domestic consumption."

Andresen would take over the chairmanship of the special House committee to investigate food shortages—now headed by Rep. Pace (D-Ga.)—if it is continued in the new Congress.

## Sewer Cleaner Pulls Roots from Drain Pipe

Leon Ross, Eugene, who operates a sewer cleaner called the roto roter, took some 20 feet of roots from a one and a half inch basement drain pipe in a residence at 893 Twentieth Ave. E., during the heavy rain Tuesday.

The roto roter is a whirling apparatus that pulls refuse from the sewer pipes. When the roots were brought out, they formed a solid mass over a foot square.
