December Rises In Own Defense

to have had its name changed in honor of a courtesan. The emperor Commodus, a ladies' man who ruled Rome from 181 to 192 A.D., discarded December in favor of "Amazonius" because his court painter portrayed one of the emperor's darlings in Amazon garb.

Caesar, too, upset the calendar-makers by tinkering with the month. When he got through with it, it had 31 days after having successfully got along for a good many centuries with only 29.

Under Vesta's Sponsorship

The Romans recognized December's wild weather by placing it under the sponsorship of Vesta, goddess of the hearth. This was probably a good choice, as no one in one of those drafty togas and a pair of open sandals would want to be anywhere but in front of a fireplace during a Mediterranean December.

The name "December" gradually spread as the Roman Legion set up posts in the hinterlands. The ancient Gauls and Anglo-Saxons had styled it "Wintermonath" (you're right—"winter month") but converted to "Heligh-monath" ("holy month") when they were Christianized. Later northern Europeans also adopted December.

Granting the 25th's importance to the world, what about the remaining days?

Dec. 7, 1542, was the birthday of Mary, Queen of Scots. Sherman took Savannah on Dec. 10, 1864, and reached the sea two days later. Russia saw a short-lived revolution on Dec. 14, 1825, when the "Decembrists" tried to overthrow the Czar because he hadn't made some promised reforms.

Bostonians in 1773 picked Dec. 16 to hold a tea party and Mrs. Beethoven in 1770 chose the 17th to bear her son Ludwig.

Dec. 21, 1620, is said to be the date the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock; despite various "debunkers" of the Pilgrim story, New England celebrates the 21st as Forefathers Day.

Summer "Down Under"

Dec. 22, of course, is the shortest day in the year and the first day of winter in the northern hemisphere. Africans, Aussies and South Americans know it as the longest day and the beginning of summer.

Three presidents of the United States were born in December, Martin Van Buren on the 6th in 1782, Andrew Johnson on the 29th in 1808, and Woodrow Wilson on the 28th in 1856.

Meanwhile, five years ago on the 7th, on Oahu Island in Hawaii, it befell to December to be the month that the Japanese chose to begin a war which the United States took in stride, but from whose effects it may take the month longer to recover.

And also, though though it may be on its pride, today is Dec. 1, important chiefly because there are "20 shopping days until Christmas."

Crowd in Argentina Tramples 14 to Death

TUCUMAN, Argentina—(UP)—Fourteen persons, several of them women, were trampled to death Saturday during a celebration in honor of Senora Evita de Peron, Argentina's first lady. More than 100 were injured and the federal government building was turned into an emergency hospital.

All scheduled public acts were cancelled including the "coronation" of Senora de Peron as "Queen of the Sugar Grinding Season."

When Senora de Peron's plane flew over Independence Square, thousands gathered there broke through police lines and several people were trampled to death. Additional casualties were reported when crowds again broke police cordons as the plane landed at the airport.

NEW YORK—(UP)—The editors of the United Press Sunday named the Republican victory in Congress as the biggest news story of 1946.

The annual list of the 10 biggest stories of the year was chosen as usual on the basis of American newspaper display and importance to American readers.

Nominations for 1946 were as follows:

1. GOP wins control of Congress.
2. Nuernberg verdicts.
3. OPA decontrols.
4. November soft coal strike leading to John L. Lewis' contempt trial.
5. Atom bomb tests at Bikini.
6. Churchill's Fulton, Mo., speech and subsequent East-West split in United Nations.
7. Forced resignation of Secretary of Commerce, Wallace.
8. Hugh Baillie's interview with Joseph Stalin.
9. William Heirens murder case.
10. National railroad strike.

tricts, which are left as they are today, and the rest of the county, which makes up one big district, called the rural school district. The latter district is to be divided into five zones, as equal in population as possible, and each zone will elect a member of the five-man board, which will govern the rural school district as far as budgets and taxes for operation are concerned.

Organization of rural school districts for purposes of support will be upheld by counties.

At present there are what are known as joint districts, part in one county and part in another. Under the rural school district bill no provision is made for continuing this arrangement—yet educators have not been able to determine how these joint districts can be divided between the counties concerned, under terms of the bill.

Other Factors Involved

Several other aspects of the measure also stand out.

The rural school district board, for instance, will receive annually from boards of present districts their proposed budgets for each ensuing year. The rural school district board will have the power to reduce, increase or eliminate any item in any of these proposed budgets.

The type of citizens elected to the board in any county, and their attitude toward education and its financial support will be of considerable importance, both to the taxpayer and to the person interested in advancement of education.

In addition, there are several questions regarding operation of the bill which as yet have not been completely answered. One of these relates to the joint school districts. Another relates to consolidation of school districts, which some supporters of the bill asserted it was designed to promote. In certain cases it appears that it will be difficult for present districts to provide the education required by state law unless they consolidate with other districts.

Ambiguity on Tuition Pupils

Doubt remains as to where control of a great many of the union high school districts will lie, as far as support is concerned.

There is ambiguity in regard to tuition pupils.

Another phase of the problem relates to operation of the basic school support bill, also approved at the Nov. 5 election, and which required the state to provide funds equal to \$50 per pupil per year for support of schools.

42% Say Press 'Unfair' to Reds

Forty-two per cent of the American public believe that newspapers make Russia look "worse than she really is," a poll recently conducted by the National Opinion Research Center at the University of Denver, indicates.

Only 21 per cent of the readers polled believe that newspapers give Russian actions and opinions fair treatment. Seventeen per cent think that newspapers take an overly-favorable view of the Soviet and 20 per cent have no opinion.

"Too Dark a Picture"

At least a plurality of every population group studied think the press paints "too dark a picture."

The researchers, who claim that their sampling system is so accurate that chances are 332 to 1 against any similar survey being more than 4 1/4 per cent at variance, asked 1265 people the following question:

"Do you think the newspapers you read generally make Russia look better or worse than she really is?"

Despite the "class struggle" theory, it is the better educated and more well-to-do reader who is most apt to think newspapers are unfair in their Russian coverage.

The survey found that 54 per cent of the professional people and 53 per cent of the businessmen think there is an anti-Russian bias. Veterans and labor unions also think the picture pre-

Attitudes Conform to Bias

The researchers also determined that readers' attitudes on specific questions conform to their opinion as to newspaper bias. People who think the news treatment unfair are less likely to blame Russia for international disagreements than are those who believe the press is biased in favor of Russia.
