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Alaska FHA Man Inspects Farms From Air, on Clear Days

Holding down the job of supervisor for the Farmers' Home Administration in the territory of Alaska demands a many-sided character—a man who can walk 15 miles to inspect a farm, or not mind in the least if he has to circle several hours over a lonely farm 80 miles from Ketchikan because the fog is too thick to land his plane.

It's all in a day's work for I. M. C. Anderson, brother of Mrs. M. C. Merrill of 120 Mayfair Ave., Eugene, who was here this week for the third of a series of conferences in Seattle, Portland and Eugene to learn new procedures and practices begun early in November when the Farm Security Administration became the FHA.

10 Years in Alaska
Anderson has been in Alaska for 10 years, the last five of which he has spent with the farm administration. Before that he was extension agent and animal husbandman with the University of Alaska extension service at Fairbanks. Loan problems are much the same in Alaska as in the United States, Anderson says, but there the similarity ends. And it ends squarely where contacting the farmers and inspecting their farms begins.

Contact by Radio
"We have several ways of contacting our people," Anderson said. "One of these is the radio message hour, which Alaska stations feature each evening. We broadcast a message to the farmer to meet the agent at a certain airfield or lake or wherever we can land."

This is one way of doing it. Another way, Anderson said, is to charter a plane, buzz the farmer's house, and drop a note telling him to come in to the office.

One farm inspection trip was done completely by air. Anderson was flying in a fish and wild life commission plane, to inspect a farm 80 miles out of Ketchikan, the nearest habitation. The plane was equipped with pontoons for landing in the bay on which the farm was situated.

'No Foggy'
"Only when we got over the farm, it was too foggy to land," Anderson reminisced, "and when the fog cleared away, the tide had gone out, so we just circled around, made our inspection from the air, and flew home again. That was a fast inspection," he said.

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Housing Control Rule Relaxed

Persons engaged in the lumber industry or the distribution of lumber, not veterans, may now get authorization to build dwellings which will cost not more than \$6000, it was reported Friday by Charles Bayles, locality housing expediter.

Qualifications are that the person must be engaged in the production or distribution of lumber, and must need the dwelling for his own use and must be unable to find a suitable home to rent or buy within his means in the area. The new plan will not give assistance in obtaining materials to those qualified, however, the expediter pointed out.

Previously, Bayles added, the lumber industry "sponsored" building for its workers with the stipulation that, in any future sale, the house must go to a veteran. The new plan will alleviate many cases of need locally, it was reported, in which non-veterans not actually working in the lumber industry but engaged in distribution phases, need housing facilities in order to continue vital work.

Interested persons are asked to contact Bayles' office in the Miner Building. The expediter is making arrangements with FHA to process applications for builders.
