

Drain Announces Civic Group's Plans

DRAIN—About 20 business and professional people of the community met recently to begin the organization of a Chamber of Commerce for this community. Three representatives were present from the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce. Officers elected were: E. S. Canton, temporary chairman; C. D. Irwin, secretary; Jim Whipple, Jack Randall and Phil Varley, the committee to draft a constitution and by-laws. The next meeting will be upon call by Canton, when this committee is ready to report. Several problems of community-wide scope will of necessity come before the citizens here within the next few months; such as paving of additional streets, sewage disposal, adequate water supply, etc., and all interested are urged to cooperate.

The city is the proud possessor of a new piece of fire fighting equipment, a pump with a new Chrysler motor mounted on a trailer, purchased by Phil Varley and Wayne Olsson in Portland last week. The machine will pump 500 gallons a minute from either a fire hydrant or a creek. With 400 feet of two and one-half inch hose and 200 feet of one and one-half inch hose and with the city truck to haul it, the pump is practically equivalent to another fire truck and cost the city less than \$400, as it was Army surplus.

Construction is expected to begin soon on a restaurant building on the vacant lot east of the Enterprise printing office on C St., to be operated by Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Neas, former operators of the Signal Inn. Clyde Catching is to construct the building, which will necessarily be small that it might pass CPA certification. Mr. and Mrs. Neas are in Bend at present.
