Funds Asked By Flood Group

Recommendations that the county court and the state legislature continue their support of the Lane County Flood Control Committee and the Willamette Basin Project Commission were made by the county group at a session Thursday afternoon at the fairgrounds.
 The committee members, meeting with grange and fish and wildlife representatives, unanimously voted for a continuation of appropriations. The state provided a \$10,000 appropriation for the commission at the last legislature, and a representative of the county flood committee will meet with Lane legislators to urge that a similar fund be approved this year.
County Funds
 The county court contribution has supported the local committee, and it was decided to request the budget committee for another appropriation this year.
 Ben Dorris, Springfield, urged the committee to consider the possibility of sending a representative to Washington, D. C., to aid the Oregon delegation in obtaining appropriation of federal funds for the flood control project. Although the suggestion was greeted with expressions of approval, no action was taken.
Opposition Seen
 Dorris, along with Mert Folts, wildlife representative, warned the committee that commercial fishing interests all along the Pacific coast were opposed to the Meridian Dam on the Middle Fork of the Willamette, on the grounds that it would interfere with salmon spawning grounds.
 Ivan Oakes, engineer-analyst for the commission, reported on progress toward appropriations made this year despite the presidential moratorium on federal spending. Fred Knox, chairman, presided at the session.

Flood Map Shows Rise Possibilities

SPRINGFIELD—A flood map, by which home-owners can determine the amount of water to be expected in their individual home areas any given high-water stage, has been prepared for the Springfield-Glenwood area, U. S. Army engineers announced Friday.
 The map is a continuation of work done each year by survey crews who determine the height of water in individual houses during the floods. The 1943 and 1938 floods were used as a basis, since engineers consider them the two extremes of moderate and severe.
 Most buildings constructed since the 1945 flood have been included in the map which has been distributed to disaster committee officials. The survey was completed during the summer and some construction since then is not included.
Fire Fighters Approve Recreation Purchases
SPRINGFIELD—Volunteer firemen Thursday night authorized the purchase of a radio and additional equipment for their newly completed recreation room at the back of the city jail.
 The room previously was used for police station and jail entrance. Separate entrance to the jail was provided last month and firemen, after re-finishing the old room, installed a sink and stove.
