City Manager Talks Billed

SPRINGFIELD—City officials will meet here Wednesday night with Herman Kehrl, executive secretary of the League of Oregon Cities, in an informal discussion of qualifications of a city manager.

Voters authorized the city manager plan in the November election. The council is required to draw up experience and training requirements before calling for bids to the job.

Mayor Claude Gerlach said Tuesday the council will not be in formal session and will limit its discussion to city manager qualifications.

SPRINGFIELD—The third annual Union High School presentation of Charles Dickens' "Christmas Carol" will be staged three times Wednesday, Principal O. O. Sabin said Tuesday.

The high school cast of 46 players will present the play first at 10 a. m. Wednesday for students of the sixth, seventh and eighth grades, who have been studying Dickens' work this month. At 1 p. m. high school students will see the play. There will be a showing at 8 p. m. Wednesday for adults.

There will be no admission charge to any of the performances, Sabin said.

Background music, arranged by Floyd Elleson of the music department, will be furnished by the school orchestra. A vocal group will furnish special numbers. Mrs. Mabel Elleson of the school's drama department, directed the production. Stage settings were furnished by the art classes.

Labor Said Eyeing Opinion Shift As Evidenced by November Vote

NEW YORK—(NEA)—Organized labor is worrying more than it cares to admit over action the next Congress may take in an effort to curb what many consider union excesses, and to cut down the frequency and seriousness of strikes.

Experienced observers believe there is a possibility this worry may avert a major strike wave that was in the making up to election day.

Organized labor's tactics this winter will depend partly upon how far it thinks the GOP will dare to go in the face of the 1948 presidential poll; what it concludes

President Truman will do in view of the increasingly open feeling of politicians that he cannot possibly be re-elected; and what John L. Lewis proves able to get away with.

However reluctant they are to concede it for publication, the smarter union politicians realize that they took a bad beating in the election.

Bans Voted
The three states whose citizens voted to ban closed shop contracts—Arizona, Nebraska and South Dakota—are predominantly non-industrial. But their act was a triple-length straw in the wind. Massachusetts overwhelmingly decided to require unions to make public financial reports.

California, hitherto strongly New Deal, rejected the Fair Employment Practices Act, promoted by the P. A. C.

West Virginia re-elected Senator Kilgore against open, active opposition by the Mine Workers. Union-sponsored candidates generally fared badly, even in strong industrial centers.

Many Tired
No alert labor politician could doubt that, rightly or wrongly, the electorate had "had enough" of many things.

It may be coincidence—but it is a tribute to his foresight—that President Daniel J. Tobin's International Teamsters, in election week, warned editorially that "strikes have become a national menace."

He added that if the international union shirks its duty of disciplining locals "the government will act," and laid responsibility for "many restrictive laws that have been passed" directly at the door of wildcat strikers.

And union strategists realize that a strike wave, such as was taken for granted before election day, would play into the hands of their more bitter critics.

British Government Restaurants Go 'Dry'

LONDON—(AP)—A House of Commons standing committee overrode Food Minister John Strachey Tuesday and voted 23 to 22 to ban the sale of intoxicants in state-operated restaurants for low-income workmen.

The prohibition issue caused a bitter committee fight last week. Proponents of the ban argued that Scottish teetotalers, who are in the majority in some districts, objected to contributing public funds to establishments selling intoxicants.

SANTA AT PENNEY'S

J. C. Penney Co.'s board of directors has authorized a special payment of two weeks' extra salary for all full-time workers who have been employed for the full 1946 year, and on a proportionate basis for extra and part-time employees and for those employed less than a year. Calvin Smith, manager of the Eugene store, said the payment would be made to 160 persons in the store here.

BID AWARDED

Western Veneer Co. of Sweet-home was awarded the bid for 392,000 board feet of timber near the South Santiam highway above Cascadia, it was announced Tuesday by the Willamette National Forest office. The Sweethome company bid \$5.55 per thousand for Douglas fir, \$2.50 per thousand for hemlock and \$7.00 per thousand for pine.

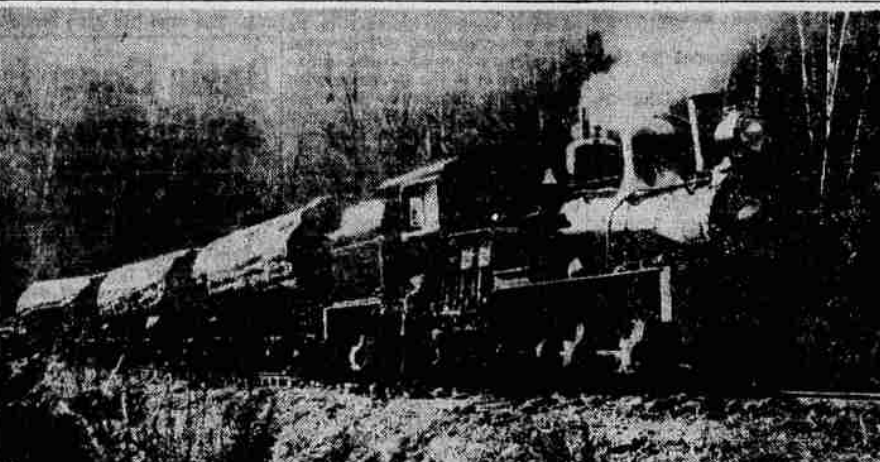
