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Cats 'Granted' Private Car

EL PASO, Tex.—(AP)—Officers armed with tear gas and riot guns, stood guard Saturday over a railway express car in which three panthers were loose, while an amusement center employee pleaded for permission to take them in hand.
 Raymond Hathaway, who said he spent 20 years as a wild animal trainer, said he would enter the car berehanded and transfer the panthers to an empty baggage car. "Those cats," said Hathaway, "are just hungry and frightened. I'll take care of them if you keep the crowd away."

Scientists See Radar Forest Protection Aid

SPOKANE, Wash.—(AP)—The use of radar as an indirect aid in fighting forest fires was urged today by the Northwest Scientific Assn.
 The association adopted a resolution asking establishment of a radar station in the inland empire as an aid in weather forecasting. The resolution said lightning causes 80 per cent of the forest fires in the area and said that accurate short-period weather forecasts would be invaluable in forest fire control.
 The scientists also asked that two regional forest and range experiment stations serving the Columbia and upper Missouri River basins be given the support and facilities necessary to determine what land management practices can do toward conservation of water resources.
 Congress was urged to provide funds for a more adequate program for control of forest insects said to be causing heavy destruction in western forests.

New Year's Eve Drivers Are Warned

Police Chief L. L. Pittenger warned Saturday that eight extra patrolmen would be on duty from 10 p.m. New Year's Eve until the following morning, to guard against traffic injuries and fatalities.
 "We have enjoyed a very good traffic record, and we don't want it ruined by hilarious foolishness on the last day of the year," Pittenger asserted as he warned drivers to leave their cars at home if they plan to drink New Year's Eve.
 Ten more traffic injuries would equal the 1945 record, and one more traffic death would equal Eugene's record of five fatalities during the previous year.

UO Speech Draws Notice

Carried in the December issue of "Vital Speeches of the Day," a New York semi-monthly publication, is an address made on the University of Oregon campus Oct. 27 by Dr. Buell Gallagher, Berkeley, Calif., specialist in the field of religion and race relations.
 The speech, "Prometheus Rampant," was delivered at the opening session of Religious Emphasis Week on the campus and was broadcast over radio station KUGN. Mimeographed copies of the address have been in great demand from students, faculty and townspeople.
 Following are some excerpts from the address:
 "The physical pain and price of the atomic bomb are being paid by the men and women of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, but the ethical price is yet to be paid by the men and women and children of America.
 "We must continue our pursuit of knowledge, redouble efforts to achieve ethical relations between men—this is our lot. The time is short. The time is now.
 "Show me a man who today believes in the use of the war method and the premise of national sovereignty, and I will show you a man who either is a complete and impractical romanticist, or else one who, knowing the facts, is a sadist who believes in race suicide."

UO Military Corps Gets New Uniforms

New interim uniforms for students enrolled in senior ROTC courses were authorized last week by the War Department, according to an announcement received on the University of Oregon campus Saturday from Major General Edward S. B. executive for reserve and ROTC affairs.
 Limited to students enrolled in ROTC courses at college level, the authorization calls for first and second year students to receive the traditional "green" blouses and trousers, while third and fourth year men will get "green" blouses and "pink" trousers. Both the elementary and advanced students will be furnished officer's short-style wool overcoats.
 It was emphasized that the authorized issues are interim only until June 30, 1948, or until such time that stocks become adequate to provide uniforms of the shade now worn by the regular army to civilian component groups, or until it is definitely determined whether or not a distinctive uniform of a different shade will be adopted for issue to senior ROTC students.
