## Affidavits Describe Japanese Brutality

TOKYO — (U.P.) — Affidavits were introduced at the war crimes trial of former Premier Hideki Tojo and his 26 co-defendants Monday telling how Allied prisoners on Molucca, 250 miles west of New Guinea, were marched into a forest and beheaded or bayoneted to death.

Warrant Officer Shigeo Hamanishi, in his affidavit, said "the weapons used for the execution were mostly Japanese swords but bayonets were also used."

Submissions of the prosecution's case is expected to be completed during the week of Jan. 13. The trial will then be adjourned for two weeks, Tribunal President Sir William Webb announced, to permit the defense additional time to prepare its case.

A week-long search for 79-year-old Thomas J. Riley, 1386 Lawrence St., Eugene, ended at Colfax, Wash., Sunday with the discovery of the aged man's body four miles north of Colfax. He had frozen to death.

The father of Mrs. Charles Hoffman, Eugene, he became lost Christmas eve while attempting to reach the home of a daughter, Mrs. Chester Harpole of Colfax. Mrs. Hoffman said Monday she had advised her father to take the train, but that he had apparently taken a bus, and became confused while trying to find the Harpole home. Funeral services will be held in Eugene, and will be announced later.

Mr. Riley was born at Eu Claire, Wis., and lived in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, before moving to Eugene in 1920. He was a member of the Catholic Church and Knights of Columbus Lodge, and made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Hoffman in Eugene.

Surviving besides Mrs. Hoffman and Mrs. Harpole are another daughter, Mrs. Mary Martin, of Colfax; a son, Ed Riley, Vallejo, Calif.; seven grandchildren; two sister in Spokane, Wash. and two brothers.

Shorter hours and no all-night work—these were the big factors in making it easy this year to supply workers for the Eugene Fruit Growers cannery operations, according to Mrs. Alice Bissell, business agent for Cannery Workers Local 656.

"Last year we had a lot of trouble getting enough men and women to fill the openings at the cannery," Mrs. Bissell said, "and it wasn't just because of the war, either. It was the nine-and-ten-hour shifts, one of which ran all night. It made it especially hard on the women."

This year the shifts were 7 1/2 and 8 hours, with the first shift starting at 7 a.m. and the late shift over by 11 p.m.

Mrs. Bissell urged that all workers now off the job report to the cannery union office at 39 1/2 Seventh Ave. W. for withdrawal cards before Jan. 5.
