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Active Club Installs Miller As President

Harold Miller was installed as president of Active Club Thursday noon, replacing Duane Mellyan, retiring president. Others taking office were Fran Kelley, first vice-president; Henry Kuchera, second vice-president; Burford Cable, secretary-treasurer; Elmer Gustafson and Ray Selgater, members of the board of governors.

A meeting of the board was announced for Monday at 7:30 p. m. at the home of Fran Kelley.

Mert Fols, president of the Eugene Sportsman Club, spoke on the fish and game resources of the county, and their preservation. He mentioned a survey made recently which showed \$543,000 brought to Lane County business men in a single year by fishermen and hunters, and pointed out that the biggest money resource now is fishing.

"Over 50 per cent of the state is non-tillable land," Fols said. "This territory must be cultivated and its use in recreation promoted."

Floods that damage lowlands must be prevented, the speaker stated. He pointed out that tributary dams will save hundreds of thousands of dollars for the county, and asked that management of the dam areas be provided to assure more fish.

Another problem facing promoters of the fish and game business in Oregon is that of enforcement, Fols said. He also suggested that an education program is needed to teach conservation of all natural resources that mean more money for the state.

Eugene Vocational School announced Friday that it would offer classes in children's clothing, tailoring and clothing construction if enough women make reservations before Monday, Jan. 6.

The class in children's clothing will start Jan. 6 and will be conducted from 7 to 10 p. m. each Monday. The tailoring class will be taught from 7 to 10 p. m. each Tuesday beginning Jan. 7 and clothing construction classes are slated to begin Wednesday, Jan. 8 with the same class hours.

Personal Property Tax Statements Sent

Personal property tax statements now being mailed to Lane County residents must be filled out and returned prior to March 1, 1947. Assessor George Stock warned Friday. The penalty for failing to make a return is a \$1000 fine.

Stock said that personal property tax assessments are made as of Jan. 1, 1947, and cover office fixtures and equipment, merchandise, machinery, goods stored in the county, farm machinery, logging and sawmill equipment, and shop tools and machines.

Automobiles and household equipment are specifically exempted from taxation under state law. The tax millage rate on personal property is the same as that on real property and the same appraisal scale—approximately 50 per cent of true cash value—is used.

Statements are sent out by mail because the large number of people with taxable personal property makes it impractical for county appraisal crews to visit everyone concerned, the assessor explained.

Army Transports Return from Orient

SEATTLE—(AP)—Two transports arriving this week at the Seattle port of embarkation will carry 1396 Army personnel returning from Japan and Korea. The USAT General H. B. Freeman scheduled to arrive at 3 p. m. on January 3 brings from Korea 1303 enlisted men, 50 officers, two American Red Cross workers and eight War Department civilians.

From Yokohama via Oahu, Hawaii, the USAT Acadia arrives next day with 42 officers, 12 War Department dependents and 24 War Department civilians.

New Form for Farm Building Now Used

Farmers or builders wishing to erect barns and other non-housing structures on farms should now apply for permits on CPA form 4423, Charles C. Bayles, locality housing expediter, said Thursday.

Previously, farm work buildings had been handled by Department of Agriculture conservation committees.

Applications for farm residence building permits should now be filed with the Federal Housing Administration. Such housing permits no longer will have priorities assistance.

Bayles also said that 198 non-housing farm building applications were approved from the beginning of the housing program in March through November, 1946, and only 417 were denied.

During the same period, 67,903 farm housing applications worth \$118,207,000 were approved and only 4933 applications, worth \$11,843,000, were denied.

Term to Begin Jan. 6 For Only Demo Official

Commissioner Walter Holland, sole Democratic candidate for county office to survive the GOP torrent in the Nov. 5 elections, will be inextricably lodged in his position come next Monday, Jan. 6.

Holland Thursday received his formal certification of election from W. B. Dillard, county clerk. The commissioner's signature on the certificate constitutes his oath of office.

According to law, Holland's new four-year term officially begins the first Monday in the January following his election.

No lame duck, the commissioner this week completes his third term in office and won't even have to adjust the chair when he comes to work Monday morning.

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Mainliner Pilot Averts Belly Landing

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—A United Air Lines Mainliner flew from Portland to San Francisco Thursday night with its crew aware that the plane's landing gear was jammed in the retracted position. But Capt. John Tremblay, the pilot, set the craft down on Mills Field in a normal landing after shaking the wheels free of the fuselage during the flight.

The plane's condition was known as soon as it took off from Portland and Tremblay flew direct to Mills Field here, passing up a stop at Red Bluff, Cal., in order to make a belly landing. The trouble was rectified in flight, however, and such a landing was unnecessary.

Man, Wife Sought For Store Burglary

A motor court receipt inadvertently left in a soft-drink machine during the robbery of the Montgomery Ward store in Eugene last Sunday, spurred a three-state search Friday for Mr. and Mrs. Carl Francis Russell, San Francisco.

A warrant charging burglary not in a dwelling was issued for C. F. Russell, and police in Oregon, Washington and California were advised to pick up the pair after the receipt showed their name, address and car license number.

The receipt was found sticking to the bottom of a coin box taken from a soft-drink machine and tossed into the water of the bottle container. The store also was robbed of two fur coats, three watches and a gold bracelet, with a total value of about \$700.

Mr. and Mrs. Russell checked in at a local motor court Sunday afternoon and checked out at 8:30 a. m. Monday, city police said. The receipt showed that they stayed in Red Bluff, Calif., Dec. 27.

Police Chief L. L. Pittenger said records from Portland police show that Russell was arrested in Portland in 1932 on charges of robbery by threat and on Mann Act charges. Portland police said he also served a prison sentence for larceny in the Maine State Penitentiary in 1935, and that he has a long record as a hotel prowler.

Officer Marion Redfern of the city police force was en route to Portland Friday to pick up copies of Russell's photograph and fingerprints. Pittenger said a stop order would be placed with the FBI in Washington, D. C., so that Russell may be held for Eugene police when he is apprehended.

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First Ski Bus to Visit Willamette Sunday

The first ski bus of the season will run to the Upper Willamette Ski Area Sunday, it was announced Friday by George Korn, board chairman of the Upper Willamette Winter Sports Assn.

Tickets are available at Hendershott's store, Korn said. The bus will leave from the store Sunday at 7:45 a. m., and will leave the ski area for the return trip at 4 p. m. A 15-minute stop will be made each way at McCredie Springs. Buses will run each Sunday through the season, Korn announced.

The ski area has been somewhat enlarged since last winter, and two rope tows are available this year instead of one. A beginner's area has been cleared, and an area for a ski school has been prepared. The ski school will start Jan. 12.

Other improvements to the area include a first aid shelter and a ski school building. The "snack shack" will be open, and will serve hot food.

The bus will make a short stop at the College Side Inn to pick up students, Korn said.

Persons driving cars to the area

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Saturday or Sunday, are advised to carry chains, as there is snow and ice on the highway for ten miles across the summit. The area has been sanded, however.
