State Forester Asks for Teeth In Timber Conservation Law

SALEM—U.S.—A plan to sharpen the teeth of the Oregon Forest Conservation Act by placing the harvesting of timber under a regulatory permit system and increasing rehabilitation fees was recommended Tuesday by State Forester Nels S. Rogers.

In his biennial report to the governor, Rogers said that "experience has shown that willful and conscious violation of the act can only be prevented by changes in the penalty provisions."

Other recommendations called for increased state support of the forest products laboratory, experimenting in utilization of wood wastes; increased state participation farm forestry, and the expansion of the forestry nursery.

The Forest Conservation Act, passed in 1941, requires logging operators to leave reserve seed trees or provide satisfactory restocking to insure future growth.

Lane Circuit Decision Upheld by High Court

The state supreme court Tuesday upheld a decision of Circuit Judge Dal M. King in a suit over interpretation of a contract as state Chief Justice George Rossman assumed his new duties as head of the court.

Judge King, who regularly presides in Coos County but serves as an alternate in Lane circuit court, had ruled in favor of Lewis Montgomery, plaintiff in the contract case. Justice Rossman upheld the decision in a hearing on the appeal of Charles Reed and W. D. Plue, losers in the case.

Woodwind Concert Billed for Thursday

First student recital of the winter term in the University of Oregon is planned for Thursday night when four students will be presented in a concert of woodwind music, by the school of music.

Margaret Holm, Sunnyside, Wash., accompanied by Wilma Jeanne Wilson, Coos Bay, will open the program with Brahms' Sonata, Opus 120, No. 2, for clarinet. An oboe solo, "Village Scenes" by Boisdore, will be played by Jeannette Grant, Vancouver, Wash., accompanied by Justine Woelke, Cutler City.

Shirley Gay Williams, Olympia, Wash., clarinetist, will play "Air and Presto" by Aubert. Her accompanist is Lucrétia Prentiss, Berkeley, Calif. A flute solo by Albert Marshall of Portland, accompanied by Sylvia Killman, also of Portland, will conclude the program. Mr. Marshall's solos will be "Cantabile and Presto for the Flute" by Enesco.

The recital, open to the public, will be given in the music auditorium on the campus at 8 p. m.

Dean Turnbull Leaves For Journalism Meets

George S. Turnbull, dean of the University of Oregon's school of journalism, left the campus Monday for Lexington, Ky., to represent the university at the meeting of the American Association of Schools and Departments of Journalism and the American Association of Teachers of Journalism, Jan. 10 and 11.

He suggested that the size of farm forestry projects be reduced, consequently calling for the hiring of additional farm foresters. Rogers said the state should finance and control farm forestry "so that every woodland owner would be advised and assisted in growing and marketing his wood products." Such a program would cost about \$75,000 annually, he estimated.

Any expansion of reforestation programs will necessitate a material enlargement of the Oregon forestry nursery, Rogers said. He also recommended that sufficient funds be made available to provide for additional personnel and equipment in the forest products laboratory.
