

Bible Printers Are Picketed

SEATTLE — (AP) — A picket appeared here before the Northwest Gospel Publishing House, which puts out religious magazines, pamphlets and tracts, but everyone was on good terms.

The Rev. Ralph Phillips, manager, and a member of the Assemblies of God, courteously invited Joe Gillin, the picket, inside to receive telephone calls and Gillin, describing himself as a "peaceful man," disinclined to argue the cause.

But a display in the window was suddenly changed, Gillin said. "Now there's nothing but Bibles, see," he exclaimed.

Secretary Edward McNamara of the AFL-Allied Printing Trades Council said the plant was doing commercial work within the union's jurisdiction and had refused to negotiate. The Rev. Mr. Phillips said the plant was fulfilling certain accounts acquired when it was bought a year ago, but that mostly the printing was for "our own churches and institutions."

"We asked the men if they wished to join the union and they declined," he said. "Most are ex-ministers and others who feel that in this publishing work they are carrying on the Gospel and prefer not to become involved in labor organizations."

Trial of Rancher's Wife Set for Feb. 24

VALE, Ore. — (AP) — Mrs. Gladys L. Broadhurst, 40-year-old red head, will go on trial for the first degree murder of her sixth husband, W. D. Broadhurst, wealthy Oregon and Idaho rancher, Feb. 24, Circuit Judge M. A. Biggs said here Wednesday.

Biggs announced setting of the trial date after Mrs. Broadhurst entered pleas of not guilty to the murder charge and also to a charge of accessory after the fact.

A deputy district attorney moved that the trial of Alvin L. Williams, 23, Mrs. Broadhurst's chauffeur who is jointly charged with the slaying, be reset so that it would follow the woman's case.

Fisherman Gets 'Million' Take

TIENSIN — (AP) — They have fish stories in China too. The paper Ta Kung Pao relates that Jung Chao, a poor fisherman off Canton caught one fish and became a millionaire. Inside the 300 pound fish were four diamond rings.

Two of them bore the Japanese name "Yamamoto," the same as the famous admiral who was shot down at sea by the Americans in 1943. His body was never found. His was a common Japanese name however.

An expert valued the rings at 20,000,000 Chinese dollars, or about \$3000 in American money.

150,000 Motorists Without New Plates

PORTLAND — (AP) — Carl Gabrielson, head of the motor vehicle division of the secretary of state's office, estimated Wednesday that about 150,000 Oregon motorists had not yet applied for their 1947 license plates.

Gabrielson said that on Dec. 31 the division had received applications for 297,748 licenses. Since then he estimated the figure had mounted to 350,000, including applications now being processed. Automobiles and trucks in the state are estimated at 500,000.

Gabrielson pointed out that motorists without new plates were liable to a fine of \$5 to \$7.50.

Line-Up for Mill Jobs Reflects 'Normalcy'

COOS BAY, Ore. — (AP) — Matters apparently were back to peacetime normal here Wednesday as far as available mill hands were concerned.

More than 30 men were on hand looking for jobs when the Coos Bay Lumber Co. mill resumed operations this week (Monday) after its holiday shutdown for repairs. About 25 men were turned away.

Company officials said it was the first time in several years that a line of men had appeared in search of work.

Limit on President's Tenure Congress Topic

WASHINGTON — (AP) — House Speaker Joseph W. Martin, Jr. (R-Mass) predicted Wednesday that the "first important measure" to pass the 80th Congress will be a constitutional amendment limiting presidential tenure to two terms.

This measure should be ready for house action by Feb. 1, Martin said while "there is practically no chance of any other important legislation being ready before that date."

'Biting' Case Ends in Court

CHICAGO — (AP) — The case of the finger-nipping false teeth ended here in municipal court with vindication of 70-year-old John M. Langhout, Ft. Richardson, Alaska, refrigeration engineer.

Langhout, who because of deafness did not hear his case called in court when Judge William V. Daly ordered his \$25 disorderly conduct bond forfeited, told his side of the altercation in which Dr. Barnett Mindlin's left middle finger was bitten.

"It was self defense," Langhout claimed. He told the court that the biting occurred in an ante-room of the dentist's office when he attempted to pay Dr. Mindlin \$10 for repairing the dentures. Langhout said the dentist demanded \$50, and then grasped the Langhout chin in an attempt to wrest the false teeth back.

Judge Daly, who had heard the dentist's testimony dismissed charges against Langhout. Langhout said he intended to leave for Seattle soon on his return journey to Alaska.

Coast Hop Crop Reduced in 1946

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — Washington, Oregon and California produced 53,171,000 pounds of hops from 40,700 acres last year, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported Wednesday. The acreage was the same as 1945 but the yield was 6 per cent lower.

Markets were seasonally quiet in the last half of December. Scattered contracts for 1947 and future crops were reported at prices 10 to 15 cents below 1946 crop quotations, with growers generally unwilling to make additional sales for future delivery because of unusual uncertainty in production costs.

Gunman Takes \$40 From News Carrier

PORTLAND — (AP) — A burly gunman robbed a 14-year-old newspaper carrier of \$40 in monthly collections Tuesday night as the youth completed the rounds of his customers.

Police said Donald Bacon reported the man apparently knew he had the money in his jacket pocket where the robber reached for the collection bag.
