Addie Laird Succumbs at 84

Another of Lane County's oldest pioneers died Tuesday. She was Miss Addie Laird, 84, born Sept. 16, 1862, at Pleasant Hill, and the daughter of Patrick and Lucinda Laird, who crossed the plains to Oregon in the early 1850's.

Miss Laird died at the home of her sister and brother-in-law, Dr. and Mrs. J. H. Lewis, 465 11th Ave. E., Eugene.

The sixth of eight children born to her parents, Miss Laird's first home was on a donation land claim three miles north of Pleasant Hill in what is now known as Eden Vale. She was a life-long member of the Christian Church.

Surviving are several nieces and nephews, including Ralph and Lawrence Laird, both of Pleasant Hill, Clarence Laird, Portland, and two sisters-in-law, Mrs. Henrietta Laird, Pleasant Hill, and Mrs. Mattie Laird, Long Beach, Calif.

Services will be held Friday at 2 p. m. at Simon Mortuary with the Rev. Hugh N. McCallum officiating. Interment will be in Pleasant Hill Cemetery.

Conference Slated For Small Mill Men

A conference for Oregon small sawmill owners will be sponsored in Eugene Saturday, Feb. 1 by the Pacific Lumber Remanufacturers Assn. It was announced Wednesday by R. T. Titus, Portland, executive secretary for the association.
 Titus said it would be the first meeting of its kind here, and that it would be exclusively for small sawmill men. Approximately 200 men who own sawmills producing less than 25,000 board feet are expected to attend, chiefly from Lane, Douglas, and Linn Counties.
 Panel discussions will include new developments in small sawmill equipment, portable gang mills, and the role of small mills in relogging.

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Minimum Stays Below Freezing

Eugene thermometers fell to 29 degrees Wednesday morning, bringing the total consecutive number of days with below-freezing morning temperatures to 12, the weather bureau reported.

Some relief was offered in the forecast, which predicted warmer weather generally over Oregon, but the cold continued to cling late Wednesday morning, as readings of only 31 degrees were reported as late as 10:30 a. m.

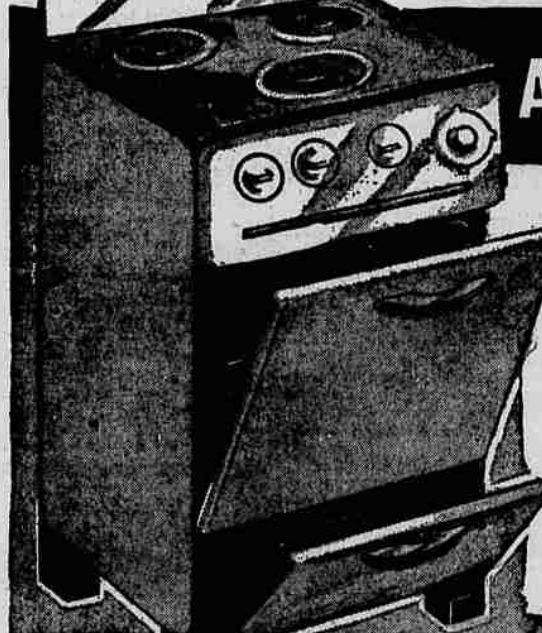
Oregon highways were improved Wednesday, with only a few stretches of icy pavement remaining, the State Highway Commission said. Santiam summit was overcast, and reported roads normal except for some sections slightly frozen. At Willamette summit, spots of ice and snow east of Salt Creek falls were reported sanded.
 Heavy fog in the Willamette

Valley continued to blanket valley cities Wednesday, and the weather bureau said it would probably remain. A light rain predicted for the coast and through northwestern Oregon may clear away the fog, however.

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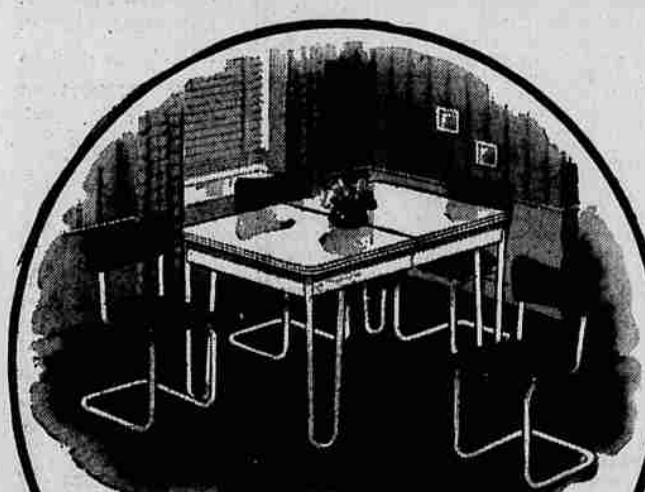
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
