PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Three 60-pound turtles destined for a one-way trip to the kitchen staged a rebellion in Leonard Yocum's restaurant Wednesday and in their brief moment of freedom they:

1. Evoked out some piercing screams from a cook.
2. Invaded the main dining room.
3. Frightened 20 patrons, sending women leaping onto chairs for safety.
4. Withdrew into their shells when a successful counter-attack marshalled by a policeman with a shovel, got under way.

The ponderous turtles escaped when a barrel in the storage room tipped over.

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French Gain In Indochina

PARIS (AP)—The French high command reported continued successes in the war in northern Indochina Wednesday but said a new concentration of Viet-Nam troops had been observed at Anoi, south of Langson-Tien Yen Road.

The concentration of troops at that point was believed to mean a possible new attempt by native forces to cut the important route to Hanoi, reestablished by the French last week after heavy fighting.

A French column from Anoi has reached a junction near Ksat with another column pushing northeast from Haibung, the commune said.

Inside Hanoi, Viet-Nam reported regular troops encircled in the native quarter of the city attempted to break out but were unsuccessful, the high command reported.

PARIS (AP)—French minister of Colonies Marius Moutet, describing the insurrection in Indochina as "full-scale war," declared flatly that his peace mission to the embattled French colony had failed. It was reported from Saigon Wednesday.

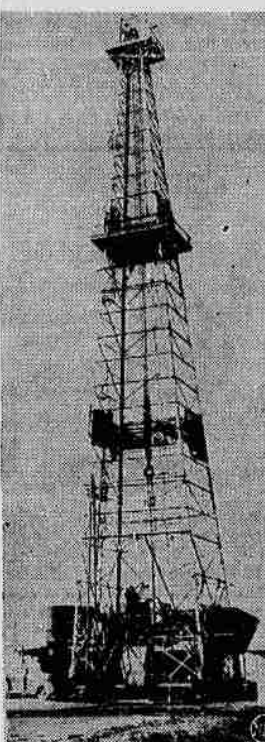
Sumner M. Snell

'Crusade Assembly' Billed by City Church

One of a series of 60 Crusade Assemblies to be held by Christian Churches throughout the nation in January and February will be held in Eugene at the First Christian Church Jan. 15. The Rev. Hugh N. McCallum, pastor of the local church, will be general chairman.

The assemblies, treating the subject "A Crusade for a Christian World," are the most inclusive movements ever launched by this protestant body, the Rev. Mr. McCallum reported.

A team of eight guest leaders will be in Eugene for the local assembly, and director will be Dr. C. M. Yocum, Indianapolis, executive secretary of the India Mission and a member of the Crusade's administrative board. All members of Christian Churches in the Eugene area have been asked to attend morning, afternoon and evening divisions of the one-day session.

Participating in the Crusade which began last September 1, will be 75 national boards, state organizations, colleges, seminaries, and student foundations. Major objectives are to stimulate the missionary outreach of the local church, and to strengthen evangelism, religious education, and stewardship. Support will be given to overseas relief and reconstruction. A maximum financial goal of \$14,000,000 will be sought.
