

Parole Revoked For 22-Year-Old

William M. Isbell, 22, Friday was ordered to serve two years in the state penitentiary by Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth, who approved a motion of the district attorney requesting the revocation of Isbell's parole from a previous sentence.

The revocation motion was submitted because of a check forgery which Isbell was said to have committed since his sentencing last July on a similar charge.

Prosecution witnesses Friday pointed to Isbell as the man who took a Luscomb Silver airplane from the Springfield Flying Service last Aug. 6. The airplane later was found abandoned at Cottage Grove and Isbell was returned to Lane from Ione, Calif., where he was being held in a state training school during investigation of alleged check forgeries in San Joaquin County.

Judge Skipworth did not conduct a formal trial on the airplane incident but declared that the youth had violated the terms of his parole by uttering a forged check and remanded him to the sheriff for transportation to the penitentiary.

Prosecution witnesses included C. E. Lombard, assistant vice-president of the Eugene branch, U.S. National Bank; Robert C. Goode, part owner of Springfield Flying Service; William T. Warden, a student pilot who identified Isbell as the man who took the airplane; and Nelson Whipples, Lane deputy sheriff who returned the youth from Ione.

Medical Examination Applications Taken

Applications for the Association of American Medical Colleges professional aptitude test are still being received by the graduate office of the University of Oregon, it was announced this week.

The deadline for filing applications was originally Dec. 27, but a number of applications can still be taken.

The examination will be given Jan. 11 in 207 Chapman Hall, under the supervision of Dr. Howard Taylor, institutional examiner for the test.

Candidates are requested to be prepared to indicate three choices of medical colleges they wish to enter. The graduate record office of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, administering the test for the Association of Medical Colleges, will forward results of each test to three medical schools without additional charge to the candidate.

Beverly Hopkins Wins Art School Scholarship
Beverly Hopkins, senior art student from Eugene, was announced this week as a winner of the Ellen Pennell art scholarship in the University of Oregon school of architecture and allied arts. Two Portland students, Marjorie Johnson, senior, and James McClintock, sophomore, also were named recipients of the awards, according to Andrew Vincent, professor of painting and drawing.

Awarded on a non-competitive basis, the scholarships are granted by the faculty of the school of architecture and allied arts to students who have demonstrated interest and ability in the art school. The scholarships provide free tuition in the university for winter term.

and in some years cash on hand has been estimated too high. The result has been that the warrants issued to offset these amounts have been piling up year by year.

A start will have to be made some time toward paying off this debt. But even if the board should decide to wait, it still faces the need for adding an estimated \$35,000 to next year's budget to keep the district from going into debt farther by this route.

Increased population may require addition of seven or eight teachers to the staff next year, and if they were paid the minimum in the suggested new salary schedule, their salaries would amount to \$16,800.

\$340,000 Increase
All these additional costs, added to the \$176,000 increase for suggested salary boosts, would total about \$340,000. To raise this money on this year's assessed valuation would require a boost in the tax rate of approximately 18 mills, so that next year's school tax rate would be about 62 mills, all other things being equal.

These figures are only rough estimates and they take into consideration no new costs or emergencies which might arise. The basic school fund voted at the last election will not aid Eugene until 1948.

Last spring the taxpayers voted nearly \$500,000 for the schools, outside the six per cent limitation, to complete a budget of something more than \$1,000,000, largest in history. Chairman Small of the teachers' salary committee says: "We believe we are justified in asking for sufficient funds to provide good schools. The citizens of Eugene have always indicated they were in favor of having good schools and it seems reasonable that they will continue to do so when they know the facts as they have been presented."

The school board has echoed these sentiments, but faces the necessity of trying to guess in advance just how great an increase the taxpayers will approve. It also must decide how much enlargement and new building shall be done and how it shall be financed. The salary proposal will be presented at a board meeting next Monday night, attended by the district's budget committee. Members of the Lane County delegation to the State Legislature have been invited, but will be unable to attend because they must be in Salem for the opening of the legislature.

Leaburg Output Again Goes to Mountain States

Eugene Water Board resumed furnishing of power to Mountain States Power Co. Friday, after repairs had been made on the water wheel and generator at Leaburg Power Plant on the McKenzie River.

Because of the power shortage, Eugene Water Board agreed to sell 140,000 kilowatt hours per day, most of the plant's output, to Mountain States. About 12,000 kilowatt hours per day were reserved for water board customers above the Leaburg plant.

The plant was closed down for repairs Dec. 24.

Truman Advises 'No Tax Cuts'

said expenditures this year will reach \$42,523,000—a \$1,000,000 gain from his August estimates. He ascribed this largely to veterans programs.

Revenues this fiscal year will reach \$40,230,000, a gain of \$800,000 over August estimates and a jump of \$5,717,000 from his forecast of a year ago. Better-than-expected tax collections resulting from high-level business activity accounted for the increases, Mr. Truman said.

'Income Will Fall'
For the coming year, however, the Chief Executive declared, income is expected to run \$2,500,000 lower—because of (1) the scheduled drop in excise taxes, (2) the end of excess-profits tax collections and (3) an expected decline in receipts from surplus property sales.

Despite this overall drop, Mr. Truman said collections from direct taxes on individuals will rise \$483,000,000 to \$19,120,000,000—assuming there is no income tax cut.

The yield from direct taxes on corporations was placed at \$8,270,000,000, a decrease of \$957,000,000.

Mr. Truman said his 1948 revenue estimates are based on the assumption that business activity will average "slightly higher" than in boom-time calendar year 1946.

There was no allowance for the possible recession, some economists have predicted. The President acknowledged in his message, however, that should a recession come it not only would lower tax receipts but increase outlays to the unemployed and to support farm prices.

Obviously anticipating Republican potshots at his program, the President stoutly defended his spending and tax revenue proposals which, respectively, are about four and six times greater than the pre-war average under Franklin D. Roosevelt.

'To Cut Debt'
"There is no justification now for tax reduction," Mr. Truman asserted, making it plain he wants a budget surplus for use exclusively in paying down the \$259,300,000,000 national debt, which costs \$5,000,000,000 a year in interest charges.

The administration view is that nearly \$33,000,000,000 of the costs in the President's budget are "fixed" and not capable of reduction. The other \$4,500,000,000-plus covers spending by executive departments and agencies, whose original requests for funds had been trimmed sharply.

"At the present time, in my judgment, high taxes contribute to the welfare and security of the country," he said.
