Florence Airport Gets \$8,400 From CAA

FLORENCE—Florence's civic airport is \$8400 richer today with announcement of a grant from the Civil Aeronautics Administration. The money is to be used in clearing, grading, and turfing, and constitutes the government's share of the \$15,000 cost of making Florence's airport a Class 1 field, with two runways 1800 feet long and 400 feet wide, with an unpaved surface. Florence is one of 19 Oregon projects included in the list, announced Friday from Washington, D.C.

Volunteer Florence citizens have been working for more than a year to advance the civic airport, which lies in the northwest portion of town, within the city limits. Last Sunday, more than 150 turned out to work for "Airport Day." Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce airport committee is H. M. Peterson, 80, who with his two sons, Ralph and Martin, has been a leader in the development. Florence veterans, including many with airforce experience, and civic organizations have been working steadily on the project.

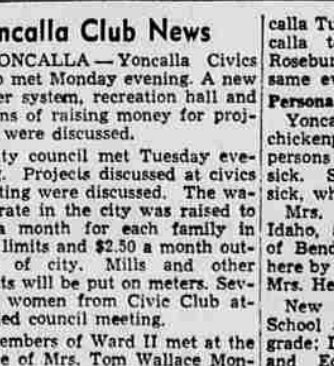

YONCALLA—Yoncalla Civics Club met Monday evening. A new water system, recreation hall and means of raising money for projects were discussed.

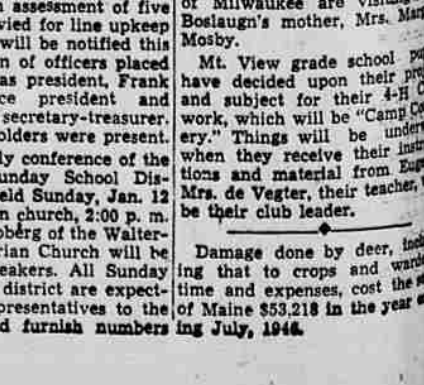
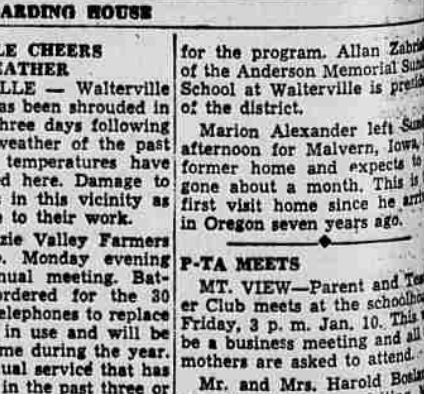
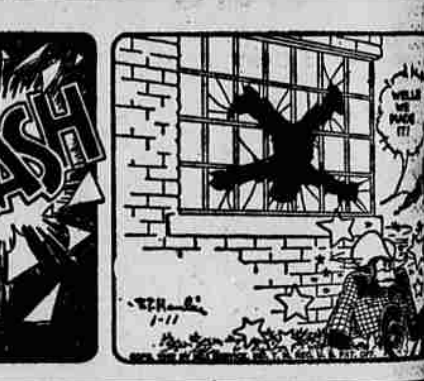
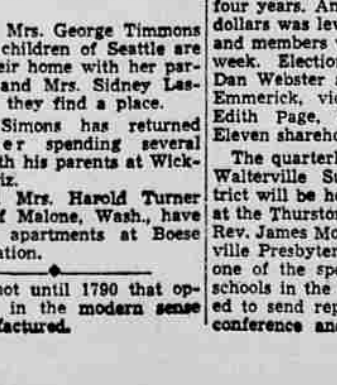
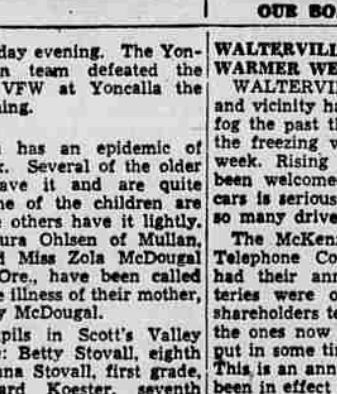
