

Fisticuffs Highlight Golf as Furgol Wins

DEL MONTE, Cal., Jan. 13.—The wildest winter tournament in PGA annals was history today as the golfing wizardry of a trio of stars exploited the spotlight with the fistic exploits of two of the most prominent personalities in the \$10,000 Bing Crosby pro-amateur tournament.

Ed Furgol, 28-year-old former Detroit amateur with the crooked arm, zoomed into prominence for the first time since he hit the play-for-play circuit as he tied with veteran George Fazio, Los Angeles, for the individual first place in the pro-amateur division.

The team of Sammy Sneed, Virginia, Va., and Roger Kelly, San Diego, California state amateur champion from Los Angeles, annexed the pro-amateur championship.

But the one-punch encounter in which popular Dick Metz, Wichita, Kan., kayaked PGA tournament manager Fred Corcoran, provided the dramatic thrill of the action on Pebble Beach Course.

Corcoran was kayaked in a brief battle with Metz that bids fair to split the ranks of the professional golfing contingent.

Next stop on the winter tour is the \$10,000 Richmond, Cal., open.

For knocking over first money in the pro-amateur division, Sneed collected \$1000 and his amateur partner, Kelly, got a radio.

Among the other leaders in the pro-amateur division were Al Zimmerman, Portland, Ore., and Marvin Bud Ward, Spokane, Wash., both with 199.

Trouble has certainly dogged the Cottage Grove High basketball team so far this season. Coach Bob Dusenberry started off the pre-season schedule by working a pair of Navy veterans, Gerry and Herold Witherspoon, in the starting lineup, only to find, just before Christmas, that the boys were just four days too old to compete. The Dusenberrys had already been reckoned as somewhat less than a threat in the District race because only one of last year's starting lineup was back, Virgil Newton.

In the first district game, which the Grove team lost to Junction City, Bob Kanel, a letterman, was out of action along with a couple of other valuable players. Everything was O. K. for the Elmira game and the Lions came up with a victory but Friday night against Eugene High had luck hit Dusenberry's squad again. Newton, who had scored 21 points in the Elmira game, was injured in a manual training accident the day of the game and was unable to play. His absence in the lineup might have made a difference since the Axemen were having their hands full until late in the game.

Eugene's Gene Miner almost missed the game too. He missed the bus that took the team to Cottage Grove. Keith Welch was supposed to pick him up and take him to the high school to meet the bus but apparently forgot or was not informed. Welch, who often replaces Miner in the lineup, denied that he purposely forgot. Miner arrived by another conveyance, however, in time to play.

The Springfield Millers came back from a 61-48 lacing at the hands of Bend and warmed their Big Six teams up by prepared for a decidedly different mode of officiating when playing the Lava Bears on their home court. The Millers say that Corvallis, also beaten by Bend at Bend, have already experienced some of the same. That pall of smoke over Corvallis is said to be emanating from Spartan Coach Fred Osborn who is still burning.

The score in the Springfield-Bend game at the end of the third quarter was tied up at 36-36. Bend scored 15 points in the last three and a half minutes of the game. Bend is now out in front in the Big-Six race with three victories and one defeat, followed by Albany and Salem with two victories and one defeat. Eugene has won one and lost one.

Word from Roseburg is that the Indians are definitely no longer interested in the Tri-County League, always a football setup. The new alignment of state football districts puts Roseburg in with Marshfield, North Bend, Coquille, Grants Pass and other Southwestern Oregon schools and the Indians will schedule most of their games in that sector. Newport and Toledo are both interested in the Tri-County circuit but it is unlikely that anything will be done toward re-organizing the league until coaches and school officials get together for the state basketball tournament here in March.

Coach Dusenberry of Cottage Grove says that a proposal may be made calling for a nine-team league including Cottage Grove, Uni High, Lebanon, Sweet Home, Newport, Toledo, Junction City, St. Mary's and Elmira. Teams would not play a round-robin schedule. Cottage Grove, Uni High and Toledo, as the probable top three teams would meet only one of the last three, Junction City, Elmira and St. Mary's, each year. It would call for some complicated schedule making but it might be worked out for a couple of years until Siuslaw, Oakridge and perhaps some other Lane County "B" League schools are ready for 11-man football.

Another idea might be to have two separate leagues with some of the same teams participating in both circuits. Thus Sweet Home, Toledo and Newport could compete in a league with Cottage Grove, Uni High and Lebanon and in another league with Junction City, Elmira and St. Mary's.

The University of Washington Huskies, currently co-leading the Northern Division Pacific Coast Conference with Oregon State, can go a long way toward making or breaking their 1947 title efforts during the next six days.

With five games scheduled in conference play, the Huskies are involved in four of them on their first road trip of the season.

Tuesday and Wednesday finds Coach Hec Edmundson's charges cavorting against the University of Idaho, victims of the Huskies' only conference starts. Two days later Washington tangles with its intra-state rival, the Cougars, in a two-game series.

The other game of the week finds Oregon State trekking to Eugene Friday in an effort to re-peat their weekend triumph over the University of Oregon.

The OSC five continued undefeated in conference play Saturday night with a 73-69 overtime triumph over the Ducks, while Washington State took a low-scoring 36-28 win over the winless Idaho defending titlist.

The Webfoot triumph came directly from the free throw line where Oregon State missed only five shots in 31 attempts. Both teams scored 48 points in field goals during the nip-and-tuck contest that ended deadlocked at 62-61 in regular play.

Oregon's Ken Hays topped scoring with 17 followed closely by Oregon State's Lew Beck with 16.

The low-scoring WSC-Idaho contest ended at 13-11 at halftime and neither team scored a field goal in the first six minutes of the second period.

High-scoring total for the night went to Eddie Gayda, Cougar forward, with 10 points. Carbaugh led Idaho with eight.

Portland, Roseburg Teams Lead Bowling

SEASIDE, Jan. 13.—(P)—Portland and Roseburg five-man teams snagged leads in Class C and B weekend competition in the sixth annual Oregon state bowling championships here and scattered up-state keggers captured individual scoring honors.

May 3-Oct. 15 Trout Season Set

PORTLAND, Jan. 13.—(P)—The Oregon Game Commission set the general trout season for six-inch minimum size from May 3 to October 15 at late sessions Saturday night.

The commission set the bag limit at 10 a day and the possession limit at 20.

The six-inch minimum will apply on all streams but coastal rivers and the McKenzie River where eight-inch fish may be taken. Coastal streams were defined as all those which flow into the Pacific, excluding the Columbia River and its tributaries and upper parts of the Rogue River and the Umpqua.

Babe Ruth's Condition Reported Satisfactory

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Babe Ruth, who underwent a neck operation a week ago to relieve intolerable pain in his head, was reported Monday to be unchanged from earlier hospital bulletins which said his condition was "satisfactory."

Ruth spent comfortable nights during the weekend, attendants said, and it was believed the rest would enable him to show improvement. He still is weak, though, and only members of his family may visit him.

The Cottage Grove-Uni High game, originally scheduled for Tuesday night, will be played Saturday night at McArthur Court.

Two Tuesday night Big-Six League games will bring the Corvallis Spartans to the armory to meet the Eugene Axemen, and the Salem Vikings to Springfield to meet the Millers. Wednesday night Eugene will go to Elmira to meet the winless Falcons in a district game.

Junction City's Tigers are currently riding high in a virtual tie with Eugene for the district lead after three straight victories over Cottage Grove, Springfield and Uni High. They may run into trouble from the Gaels, however.

Eugene will be trying to get back into the thick of the Big-Six race with a victory over Corvallis and the Springfield Millers will be seeking their first Big-Six victory against the strong Vikings.

All games are set for 8 p.m.

NBA Urges Zivic To Hang Up Gloves

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—(AP)—As the National Boxing Association issued quarterly ratings on the world's boxers Monday, it suggested that 33-year-old Fritz Zivic hang up his gloves; for he "is working serious harm on the sport by his unsatisfactory performances."

The ratings disclosed a record of five "logical contenders" in the middleweight division and a contrasting record of none in the heavyweight and welterweight classes.

At the same time, the comments of Abe J. Greene, president of the N.B.A., disclosed that Zivic, ex-welterweight champion, "leaves a trail of dissatisfied fans behind" his bouts.

Greene's statement recalled that Pittsburgh Fritzle had retired many months ago, "conceding his best days were past", but he recently returned to the ring and has been able to cash in on his name.

Greene said, "It is conceded that perhaps Zivic, as a master of the art of the foil, is able to spar his way out of physical harm's way, but in so doing, he leaves a trail of dissatisfied fans behind.

"This is not to be construed as a reflection on Zivic personally. On the contrary, it is designed to act as a check rein on an old fire-horse still responding to the sound of the bell."

OSC-Oregon Tiff Sets Records

Coach Howard Hobson's University of Oregon Webfoots, beaten in two out of their three Northern Division starts, are determined to boom back in the championship race here Friday night—in the second of four meetings this season with the Oregon State Beavers.

A flock of records were established at Corvallis Saturday night, but Oregon was on the short end of a 73-69 score in an overtime contest. It was the second straight overtime tilt between the two "civil war" rivals, the Webfoots taking a 42-41 decision in an extra period at Corvallis at the close of the 1945-46 season, knocking the Beavers out of the championship race.

The 142-point total Saturday bettered by eight points the previous aggregate record total in the conference—topping Oregon's 69-65 triumph over Washington State in Eugene last season. It also shattered the previous Oregon-OSC scoring mark that had previously stood at 106 points, OSC's 55-51 victory in 1945. Neither the Webfoots nor the Beavers had ever scored as many points against each other. Highest previous points were 59 by OSC and 53 by Oregon, both last season.

Although no statistics were available, the 52 personal fouls and two technicals called against the two teams were believed to have been new conference marks—along with Oregon State's 16 consecutive freethrows made good. The gift shots were extremely instrumental in the final outcome—with field goals being even at 24 each. OSC made an amazing total of 25 out of 29 freethrows while Oregon hit 21 out of 33.

Little Stan Williamson, whose fifth field goal put Oregon ahead 66-64 in the opening minute of the overtime, remained among the league's individual scoring leaders with 16 points—a total of 46 for three games.

It appears unlikely that Hobson will shift his lineup for the Friday night game in view of Oregon's "moral victory" showing against an OSC team that was highly favored.

Two other Oregon quintets will see action this week. Coach Ted Schopf's Oregon Frosh, who defeated Medford 33-28 Saturday night for the ninth straight win for the Ducklings, will play Salem High here Thursday and travel to Grants Pass Friday night. The Oregon J-V's, unbeaten in ten starts, play two City AAU games Monday and Wednesday nights at McArthur Court, and will travel to Corvallis Tuesday to engage the OSC J-V's in the first of a four-game series.

Anti-Fix Law To Be Offered

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—(P)—Rep. Herbert (D-La.), introduced legislation Monday setting out heavy penalties for attempts to bribe athletes and sports officials, asserting that "sports is big business and the public must be protected from the fixers, the chiselers and the grafters."

Herbert said in a statement his action stemmed from "the recent professional football scandal involving Alvin Paris for allegedly attempting to bribe Frankie Filchuck and Merle Hapes of the New York Giants."

Paris was convicted in New York last week on the bribery charge. National League Commissioner Bert Bell now is studying the future status of Filchuck and Hapes in professional football, although both have been paid their full cut from the league championship game.

Herbert introduced a second measure covering only the District of Columbia, a bill patterned after the New York state statute under which Paris was prosecuted.

But his federal legislation—the first, he said, of its kind ever presented—is based on the premise that athletes and athletic teams come under the jurisdiction of the federal government "just as do interstate carriers, corporations and trade unions."

The federal statute covering interstate athletic contests would carry a penalty of up to ten years imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine. The District of Columbia measure would fix the maximum penalty at five years imprisonment and a fine of \$1000.

Three Teams Tied In Winter Golf Play
