

Traffic Lights Voted by Council

SPRINGFIELD — The city council Monday night ordered execution of an agreement with the State Highway Commission to provide for the installation of a traffic control system at the Fifth and Main Sts. intersection.

The agreement calls for automatic control lights, enlarging of the intersection and stipulates that parking will be forbidden within 30 feet of the intersection. Estimated cost of the installation is \$1600. The city must pay half.

The city is responsible for alterations at the intersection and must maintain and operate the lights. The highway commission retained the right to regulate their timing.

The city has \$375 budgeted for lights. To make up the \$425 deficit the council withdrew that amount from the equipment sinking fund rather than have the state deduct it from coming gasoline tax refunds.

An attempt to have a new vote on the \$80,000 sewer assessment passed last meeting, Jan. 2, was dropped after City Attorney W. S. Fort declared the objection should have been raised at that meeting.

Since it was not, he said, the ruling of the chair would be presumed to be correct.

Councilman Carl Lewis, Ward 5, called for a new vote Monday night before the minutes were approved.

Committee heads appointed by Mayor Claude Gerlach and approved were: John Ashworth, judiciary; J. W. Boeshans, finance; Carl Lewis, police; J. M. Larson, fire and water; Fred O. Kenschot, street; Gilbert Shoush, health.

Councilmen Boeshans, Lewis and Ashworth were appointed to the building committee. No chairman was named. Kenschot, Boeshans and Lewis were chosen for the transportation committee.

Department heads went unchanged. They are: C. K. Pryor, police; Harry Melson, fire; C. M. Coning, building; Paul Basford, street; Dr. A. Triolo, health; William S. Fort, city attorney; John Quiner, city engineer, on a part time basis.

The council passed Ordinance 885 establishing west to east one-way traffic in the alley between Main and North A from Second to Seventh Sts. The first reading of Ordinance 886, prohibiting the use of dynamite within the city without a license, was made.

Fort was instructed to draw an ordinance establishing a sewer hookup charge for persons who break in on city sewer but have not been assessed.

Fred O. Kenschot, Ward 1, was chosen president of the council after deadlocking on three separate votes with Carl Lewis, Ward 5.

Police Car Ends in Ditch

SPRINGFIELD — The city police car was "ditched" Tuesday at the end of a midnight chase over icy streets and roads that called in three state police cars, cars belonging to two deputies and caused the Eugene police department to block the Ferry St. bridge.

The cause of the chase, a two-tone auto that pulled away from the Springfield vehicle at 90 miles an hour, was not apprehended.

The chase started when city patrolmen spotted a vehicle doing an estimated 50 miles per hour while going east on Main St. Patrolman Del Duff pursued in the police car but, he said, couldn't get within two blocks of the unidentified vehicle.

The Springfield car failed to negotiate a curve on the Mohawk Road and skidded into a ditch where it stuck. The car, however, was not damaged nor the driver injured.

Meanwhile, other police cars searched the vehicle, which they ranged highways east of here. It was sure must "really be hot."

Tuesday morning Springfield police were thanking their two-way radio. Within a few seconds after the first alarm was sent to the central station in Eugene, police cars were literally pouring into Springfield.

Truman Plans Bi-Party Talks

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman has decided to call Republican congressional leaders in for frequent consultations, Rep. Rayburn (D-Tex.) said Monday after a White House call.

Rayburn, former speaker and now leader of the Democratic minority in the House, said no date has been set for the first bi-partisan conference.

What the President has in mind, Rayburn told White House reporters, is joining consultations with Republican and Democratic Party leaders in Congress.

These conferences, Rayburn said, will not be the regular Monday morning get-togethers the President had with Democratic leaders last year when his party controlled both houses.

Mr. Truman will call the leaders to the White House to discuss measures where there is prospect of cooperation. Similarly, the Capitol Hill spokesmen would be in a position to initiate consultations by notifying Mr. Truman of matters they wish to take up with him.

The consultations would be in line with the President's expressed desire to cooperate with the Republican majority.

They would involve the calling of Senator Vandenberg of Michigan, the president pro-tempore of the Senate, and Senate Majority Leader White of Maine, Speaker Martin of Massachusetts, Republican Majority Leader Haleck of Indiana, Rayburn, representing House Democrats, and Senator Barkley, of Kentucky, the Senate minority leader.

Births Set All-Time Record in Oregon

PORTLAND — (AP) — The state had a busy time over Oregon in 1946. The State Board of Health reported births reached an all time record and estimated the year's deliveries at 27,890. The exact figures will not be known until all reports are in from counties for December.

The previous record was 25,380 in 1943.

New Trial Moved In CPA Test Case

The need for the increase, and it was pointed out by Clarence Diebel of Eugene High that the day has passed when a community can have superior schools and underpaid teachers. Small said his take-home pay is \$208 a month.

Chairman G. D. MacLaren of the board recalled that the board has always enjoyed the confidence of the people and the taxpayers so far have voted extra funds whenever the board has asked for them, but he emphasized the statement that the board has always kept its requests down to what it believed the taxpayers would think reasonable. He said it is important for the board to retain that confidence.

Erwin Jullis of Woodrow Wilson school said that if the board does not back up the proposed schedule, morale is going to be mighty low and that the confidence of the teachers is very important to the board, too.

Virgil Cameron of the board estimated that the requested boost, with other extra expenses that must be met, coupled with possible city or county increases, might mean that the combined city, county and school tax rate for Eugene taxpayers would rise from the present 76 mills to about 96 mills, and asked if the salary committee would propose that the taxpayers be asked to approve 96 mills.

"We'll never know whether they'll do it until we try it," Small replied, again urging an aggressive campaign.

The doctors reached the agreement at a meeting of representatives of the Eugene medical associations, labor and management representatives and members of the Chamber of Commerce clinic committee. The clinic committee, headed by Harry Wright, has been working since summer on proposals to establish a medical center here to halt the inconvenience and delay of reporting to Eugene doctors for minor ailments.

At an earlier interview it was pointed out that there are approximately 1800 industrial workers here insured by the two associations.
