Morse Assails GOP Proposals, Sees 'Ike' as People's Choice

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower "has the best chance of all the candidates on both sides" to occupy the White House in 1948, in the opinion of Sen. Wayne Morse, Oregon Republican.

Speaking in a radio forum broadcast, Morse said also that he believed "Mr. Truman is definitely in the ring" for the presidential nomination.

"He is slugging right now, and he has the Republicans on the defensive," Morse said.

"They should tell the people that now is the time to save and pay our debts or the dollar won't be worth a quarter of what it is today," he said.

"If the Republicans continue their anti-labor policy and their fiscal policies which will lead to fiscal isolation, they will lose both Congress and the White House in 1948—and they will give us the worst era of labor unrest in the history of the country."

Morse sized up the 1948 presidential prospects in these words: "There are too many Republicans after the same job, they'll wash each other out by 1948."

"People are more interested in personalities than in party labels, and in that connection there is a great deal of interest in Gen. Eisenhower."

Paraguay Under State of Siege

ASUNCION, Paraguay — (AP) — A new cabinet made up of three army men, a naval officer and four civilians ruled Paraguay Tuesday under a state of siege proclaimed by President Higinio Morinigo after discovery of what the government called a plot by "anarchist groups and the Communist party" to overthrow Morinigo.

The president, installed in office by the army in 1940, assumed command of the armed forces Monday and declared a 30-day state of siege, thus apparently ending a truce between the Colorado and Febrista Parties which had been considered the first step toward restoring constitutional government in Paraguay.

The first film, "Tatters," was produced in 1911 and deals with slums. The second, "Underworld," 1927, features Evelyn Brent and George Bancroft. Both are described as "tear jerkers."

Quints Said Born in China

SHANGHAI — (AP) — A Foochow dispatch to the newspaper Sin Wan Pao said Tuesday that quintuplet boys were born Jan. 2 to Mrs. Huang Ping of Loo-Chichen village, Hanan District, of Fukien Province.

Mother and children, the paper said, are doing well.

"This is the second time this year that five male babies were born at the same time," Sin Wan Pao said.

Confirmation of the Hanan quintuplets, which were the first reported, has been sought by the United Press. But communications to the interior are so difficult that a message to the village magistrate inquiring about the multiple births was expected to require up to a month for an answer.

Communications to Fukien province are even poorer.

Striking Taxi Drivers Picket Cab Stand

Striking taxi drivers formerly employed by Terminal Taxi were picketing the taxi office at 450 Willamette St. Tuesday at the change of shifts.

D. B. McFadyen, business agent for Teamsters Local 57 with which the 28 striking drivers are affiliated, said the pickets were placed Monday evening and would be on duty at the change of each 12-hour shift.

Reason given by McFadyen for the appearance of pickets, 16 days after the drivers left their jobs, was that "no attempt has been made even to discuss the matter with us."

Union attorneys in Portland last week-end filed unfair labor practice charges against the company, managed by Mr. and Mrs. John Fortenberry.

Salem Man Arrested For Tax Evasion

PORTLAND — (AP) — Edward Stortz, Salem, posted \$3500 bond and was released Monday after arrest on a federal grand jury indictment charging tax evasion.

U. S. Deputy Marshal George Vranizan said Stortz was arrested Monday in Salem and given a hearing before Justice of Peace Joseph B. Felton.

The government accuses Stortz of failure to report correct net income in 1942, 1943 and 1944. The 1942 count involves a report of net income of \$2981 for which Stortz paid taxes of \$320. The government claims his income was \$24,336 that year and his tax should have been \$8889.

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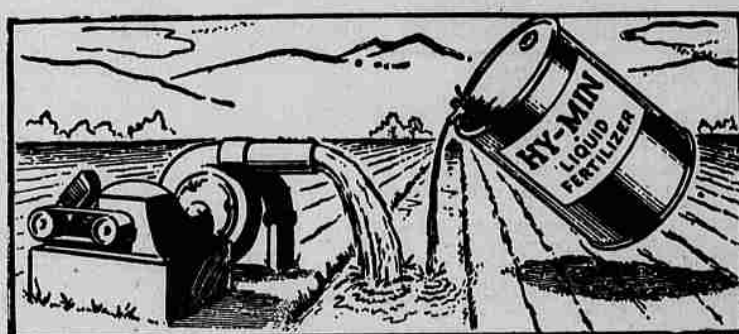
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
