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Rodents Star In Poison Test

Two live rats, confined in wire-mesh cages, Saturday starred in a city-county health department staff demonstration of poisons brewed by Donald C. Dickey, rodent control supervisor.
Rat No. 1, a vicious though calm subject, sat in his cage and glared at pointing fingers, but his brains proved less active than his temper as he consumed repeated doses of red squills, which were administered in small portions to give observers a chance to check on the various stages of his reaction to the poison.
Dickey said that the squill-eater would die in from five hours to a day.
Rat No. 2, active and curious, was still romping around in his cell 50 minutes after swallowing a dose of 1080. But in the next five minutes he became very sleepy and within 20 more minutes was dead.
Dickey said that the rodents were trapped along the Eugene millrace. The red squill poison is used in and near buildings because it gives the victim time to get outside and search for the water which the squills cause it to desire.
The faster and more effective 1080 is used in outside areas where there is little danger that the dead rat's body will cause offensive odors. Dickey sometimes spreads the poisons "straight" and sometimes in mixtures, depending on how wise the rats in a particular vicinity have become during previous control projects.

Grand Tetons Chosen For Obsidian Outing

The Grand Tetons of Wyoming was chosen as the site of the 1947 Obsidian Summer Camp at a meeting of the board of directors of the outdoor club last week. President Bob Lyon appointed Elmer McBee as chairman of the summer outing committee.

Activities of the ski committee will be announced soon, and will include cross-country trips to Odell Butte, Diamond Peak, Collier Glacier, Fairview Lookout in the Bohemias, and the staging of a junior ski meet at Hoodoo Bowl which would extend to the top of Hoodoo Butte.

Cancellation of the first of a series of five lectures on Egypt by Dr. Henri Frankfort, scheduled for 7:30 p. m. Monday, was announced by the University of Oregon lecture committee.
Transportation difficulties prevented Dr. Frankfort's arrival here on time for his Monday night address, it was explained.
The well-known authority on ancient Egypt will give the first of his lectures at 4 p. m. Tuesday in room 207 Chapman hall on the university campus.

Series of Regional Police Schools Planned for 12 Oregon Cities

A series of regional schools for city policemen, to be sponsored by the Oregon Assn. of City Police Officers, is being planned for 12 Oregon cities, it was announced this week on the University of Oregon campus by Henry F. Beistel, executive secretary of the association.
Planned for March and April, the training program will cover basic police subjects, Beistel explained, and will be attended by law enforcement officers from all levels of government.
Tentative plans call for schools to be held in Albany, Astoria, Bend, Coos Bay, Corvallis, Eugene, Klamath Falls, La Grande, Medford, Pendleton, Salem, and The Dalles. Policemen from smaller towns will be invited to attend classes in the nearest town where schools are to be set up.
Already cooperating, Beistel added, are the bureau of municipal research and service of the university, the League of Oregon Cities, Federal Bureau of Investigation, and Portland police bureau.
The program will probably consist of one day of training, each week in each city for eight weeks, Beistel explained, with special instructors to handle each day's lectures. Instructors are to be drawn from federal, state and local law enforcement officers. Most of the teachers would be from the FBI and Portland.

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Cellist Claims Idaho Home

Joseph Schuster, renowned cellist who will appear in Eugene for the Civic Music Assn. Wednesday evening, at McArthur Court, has been an American citizen for several years, and is married to an American girl from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. They have an 18-month-old son, whom they take back to Idaho to spend the summers. Their winter residence is New York City.
Although the United States has been his adopted country since 1934, the young artist has an international background. He was born in Constantinople. Because his parents were Russian, he received his musical education at the St. Petersburg Conservatory. He served his apprenticeship in professional music as a member of the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra under Wilhelm Furtwangler, then came to New York to join the New York Philharmonic Symphony Society under Arturo Toscanini.
Three years ago, he resigned to follow a concert career, and has been one of the busiest of the artists since then. He has given recitals throughout the United States, Canada and Mexico, and last spring played 35 sold-out concerts in South American capitals. He also has made many radio appearances.

Highway Conditions Reported Improved

Oregon highways were much improved Monday after rain and warmer temperatures melted snow and ice from many sections. Slippery conditions from packed snow and ice were reported on only a few mountain and eastern Oregon roads.
Santiam summit reported two inches of new snow over the weekend, and some light frozen slush and packed snow on the roads. At Willamette summit, snow and rain fell Sunday night, resulting in packed snow and slush across the summit.
Southern Oregon was shrouded in fog, with Roseburg, Grants Pass and Medford reporting foggy highways.

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High City Safety Rating Forecast

Police Chief L. L. Pittenger of Eugene predicted Monday that Eugene would be among the top ten cities in the 10,000 to 50,000 class in the National Safety Council's annual nation-wide safety contest.
Eugene was 33rd in the nation in 1945. Contesting cities are judged on the basis of traffic fatalities, on accident records, traffic engineering, law enforcement, ratio of arrests and accidents, school safety, and public education.
Pittenger pointed out that Eugene's enforcement program is 200 per cent greater, that there was one less traffic fatality than the year before, and that traffic injuries increased by only 16. The number of accidents increased from 1588 to 2416, but this was attributed partly to increased reporting on the part of drivers.
