

Amusement Tax Plans Readied

all of whom would have to make bi-monthly reports.

The principle of Harvey's admissions tax bill also has the endorsement of the Tax Study Commission. It would apply also to restaurants which provide entertainment, pool halls, bowling alleys, race tracks and carnivals.

Harvey said he hoped the measure would raise enough money so that old age pension appropriations would no longer have to depend on liquor revenues.

Legislative Ways and Means Committee members meanwhile estimated a state budget deficit of at least \$13,000,000, instead of \$9,000,000 as estimated by State Budget Director George Alken.

Sen. Dean H. Walker, Independence, chairman of the Senate Ways and Means Committee, said a preliminary study showed a \$14,000,000 deficit, while Dr. F. H. Dammasch, House Ways and Means chairman, said the deficit is about \$13,000,000.

Both men emphasized that their estimates are only tentative, depending in a large measure on the disputed estimates of liquor profits for the next two years.

Governor Snells proposed to take up \$8,000,000 of the deficit by using corporation income tax surpluses is expected to reach the floor for final action in a few days, but House leaders said they doubt it will pass. They believe the money should continue to be used to reduce property taxes.

Anti Revenue Bills
The Ways and Means Committees are stymied until they know what revenue measure the legislature will pass. Action on the corporation excise measure would enable them to at least start work on appropriations.

Senator Walker said the committee would ask the State Liquor Control Commission accountants to certify estimates on how much liquor profits will be in the next two years, and that the legislature would accept this estimate as final. The commission already has estimated its profits at \$10,380,000, while Budget Director Alken's estimate is about \$23,000,000.

Parole Board Asks
The State Parole Board asked the Legislature Tuesday for complete authority in fixing sentences of persons sent to the penitentiary. The board proposed law would compel the sentencing judge to give the maximum sentence permitted by law, and the board would decide the sentence after the man is in prison.

The board said its idea would permit uniformity in sentences. The board also asked for an immediate penal institution, increases in staff personnel, and salary increases.

Navy Fliers Saved by Luck

ABOARD THE USS MT. OLYMPUS AT LITTLE AMERICA—(AP)—(Delayed)—It's lucky for Capt. George Dufek and Lt. Cdr. Walter M. Sessums that a Navy crashboat was nearby when their helicopter crashed into icy polar waters Sunday.

Within five minutes after the ship struck, the crashboat crew had the two aboard the seaplane tender Pine Island where a doctor administered stimulants.

Sessums, whose home is in New Orleans, was pilot of the helicopter and Dufek, commander of the eastern task force in the Navy's Antarctic expedition, was a passenger.

The helicopter plunged into the sea after its rotors became iced. The crashboat commanded by Ensign Herman C. Stagen of Peru, Ill., and Boatswains Mate 1-c Lawrence H. Pitzer of Springfield, Ill., was only four lengths away.

Sessums, using his head as a battering ram, smashed the plexiglass covering on the submerged cockpit. He and Dufek crawled through the top and Seaman William Young of New York City, grabbed them and pulled them aboard the crashboat.

"Thanks, that water's cold," Dufek said.

The helicopter sank.

Britain's Economic Crisis Highlighted

LONDON—(AP)—Britain's Labor government highlighted the opening of a momentous session of Parliament Tuesday with an appeal to the nation's workers and employers to work harder and more efficiently for postwar recovery.

Facing a bitter fight in the House of Commons on such measures as the nationalization of transport and electricity, the government warned that Britain's economic situation is "extremely serious" and called for a renewed drive to increase production.

A grave picture of manpower shortages, worn-out factories and threats of inflation was presented in a white paper issued Monday night as a prelude to parliamentary debate on government economic plans to be presented within the next few weeks.

Standard Oil Co. Increases Prices

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—The Standard Oil Co. of California Tuesday announced a half-cent a gallon increase in the wholesale and retail price of gasoline and kerosene.

A one-quarter cent increase in the price of diesel and heating oils also was announced. Standard gave as a reason for the price hikes that it wished "partially to cover higher costs of doing business."

In some areas, "further slight increases" have been posted partially to offset an increase in transportation rates which have been in effect generally in the company's territory since Jan. 1, Standard said.
