Highway Snow Turns to Slush

Packed snow on many of Oregon's mountain passes was turning to slush Tuesday morning as temperatures continued to rise, the State Highway Commission reported.
 Most of the pavement at Santiam pass was reported bare and frosty, but spots of slush and ice remain. The area has been sanded. At Willamette pass, spots of packed snow and ice remained throughout the section.
 Short stretches of one-way traffic were reported on some coast roads due to slides.

Pinball License Plan Changed

SPRINGFIELD — The city council's finance committee Monday night revised its proposals to license pinball machines and punchboards by adopting a license fee plan for distributors and a percentage tax on the devices. Previously the council had approved a plan to license both the machines and distributors.
 Committee members said it would be impossible to estimate accurately the revenue that would be derived from the new system but one distributor stated the income should be around \$10,000 annually.
 Under the new plan distributors would be charged a \$125 quarterly license. The machines would be assessed at 10 per cent of the gross. Collections would be made in the presence of a city employee and the payment is to be made at the time of collection, the committee stipulated.
 Distributors of punchboards would be charged a \$50 annual license. In addition the city would collect three per cent of the face value of each board.
 The monthly levy on juke boxes was dropped from a proposed \$5 to \$2. The committee proposed no distributor's license.

Envoy Resigns; Next Named
 WASHINGTON—(AP)—Stanley K. Hornbeck, ambassador to The Netherlands, resigned Tuesday and President Truman picked Herman B. Baruch to succeed him.
 The White House said the nomination of Baruch, now ambassador to Portugal, will be sent to the Senate within a day or so. Baruch is a brother of Bernard L. Baruch, the elder statesman.
 Presidential Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said Mr. Truman accepted the Hornbeck resignation with "reluctance."
 Hornbeck gave "personal" reasons for resigning, Ross added.
 Originally appointed to The Netherlands post in September, 1944, Hornbeck first offered his resignation when the Truman administration came into office in 1945. He was persuaded then to remain on the job.

Portland Motorists Can Use Loading Zones
 PORTLAND—(AP)—The weary motorist who only wants to dash into a cleaning store and leave a suit or drop off a pair of shoes at the cobblers will now get a break in Portland.
 Acting Chief Deputy City Attorney J. O. Stearns said private automobiles were entitled to use loading zones, as do trucks, provided the cars remain no longer than the 20-minute time limit.

Marie Johnson Bebernes
 Marie Johnson Bebernes, 84, Junction City, died at a Eugene hospital Tuesday. Born Jan. 5, 1863, at Denmark, she married Nels Johnson at Omaha, Neb., March 10, 1885. He died in 1900, and in 1922 she was married to Soren Bebernes. He died in 1927.
 Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Alice Jensen, Seattle, and Mrs. Helene Rubotson, Oakland, Calif.; three sons, John Johnson, Spokane, George, of Lincoln, Neb., Alford, of Junction City; a sister, Sena Petersen, Eugene; three brothers, Otto Wilde, Junction City, Adolph, of Junction City, and Jim Wilde, Washington; nine grandchildren; eight great-grandchildren. Two grandchildren were killed during the war, and four children preceded her in death.
 Funeral arrangements will be announced by Miller-Sherman Mortuary in Junction City.

 Dr. Pierre Van Rysselberghe, professor of chemistry in the university, was selected academy treasurer for this year, and Dr. Andrew F. Mouraud, head of the university's mathematics department, was named to succeed himself as chairman of the academy's mathematics section.
